Dear Reader,

We are pleased to present this report on our 2006 graduating class. The 1,175 students who received degrees were drawn from all six cities and nineteen towns in Westchester county and reflect closely the demographic characteristics of the county in terms of gender and ethnic background.

Our graduates are continuing their education at 36 colleges throughout the United States. In total, almost three-fifths (58.1%) of the respondents transferred to a four-year college, and nearly three-fourths (73.8%) are attending full-time.

Almost three-fourths (71.4%) of the respondents also are employed either full-time or part-time. They are employed by 77 different companies in Westchester county; another 19 companies in New York State, but outside the county; and an additional 14 firms located in other states. The mean salary for those holding full-time jobs was \$43,853. The median salary was \$35,000.

The evaluation by the graduates of the college and the services it provides continues to remain high. In evaluating the *Overall Quality of Instruction* at Westchester Community College, 97.1% were either *very satisfied* (62.7%) or *satisfied* (34.4%). With regard to their *Overall College Experience*, 98.1% were either *very satisfied* (77.1%) or *satisfied* (21.0%).

The accomplishments of our graduates are a great source of pride to us. We believe you will share these feelings as you read this report.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The graduates of Westchester Community College who responded to the 2006 Graduate Survey reported an increase in salaries over the graduates of previous years. The mean salary for those employed full-time is \$43,853, up \$1,857 from the previous year (\$41,996). Almost three-fourths (71.4%) reported being employed after six months, which is lower than the previous year's graduating class (79.5%).

Employment: The 2006 graduates continued to feel positive about their jobs.

Satisfaction with Job: Over four-fifths (85.9%) of the graduates who responded were either *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their jobs, and over four-fifths (80.2%) also were either *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their *Opportunity to Advance*. Almost four-fifths (76.5%) further felt that their education at the college prepared them for their current job either *to a great degree* or *to a slight degree*.

Location of Employment: Over two-thirds (62.0%) of the 2006 graduates who reported being employed were employed in New York State. Almost half (49.7%) of the graduates who reported they were employed found employment in Westchester county. Another 12.3% of the graduates were employed outside Westchester, but inside New York State, while 9.0% found employment outside the state. The location of employment for 29.0% could not be determined.

Education: The percentage of the graduates who reported that they transferred to a fouryear college increased slightly this year, with 58.3% of the graduates reporting they had transferred to a four-year college compared to 56.0% of the 2005 graduates.

Attending College Full-Time: Of the respondents who reported continuing their education, almost three-fourths 73.8% reported attending college *full-time*. This is a slight decrease from last year's class (74.0%).

Degree Aspirations: As in previous years, a high percentage of the respondents (87.5%) intend to obtain a bachelor's degree or even a post baccalaureate degree. This percentage is slightly higher than the previous year's percentage of 85.9%.

Factors Facilitating Transfer: Responses to a set of questions exploring factors important to facilitating student transfers showed that the ones considered *very important* by the largest percentage of respondents are: *Availability of Program Desired* (71.9%), *Location and Cost* (71.2%), and *Reputation of College* (62.8%).

Demographic Characteristics: A review of the demographic characteristics of the entire Class of 2006 reveals only slight changes from previous graduating classes.

Gender: The percentage of female graduates decreased slightly from 62.0% in 2005 to 59.1% in 2006.

Ethnic Background: The percentage of Black graduates (17.5%) remained about the same as last year's class (17.6%), while the percentage of Hispanics increased to 15.7% from 14.7%.

Age: The percentage of students graduating under the age of twenty-two (21.6%) decreased slightly over last year's class (22.5%). The percentage of graduates in the 22 to 29 age group (49.2% in 2006) increased substantially compared to 43.0% in 2005.

<u>Reasons for Attending:</u> Almost half (48.5%) reported that their major reason for attending Westchester Community College was to *Increase My Chances to Get a Specific Job or a Better Job*. Over one-fourth (28.2%) did so in order to transfer to a four-year institution. The remaining fifth (23.3%) did so to *Reach Other Goals Such As Self-fulfillment*.

Evaluation of College Experience: The respondents to the survey continue to give positive response on several broad questions concerning Westchester Community College.

Overall College Experience: As in previous years, the overwhelming majority (98.1%) of the 2006 graduates were either *very satisfied* or *satisfied* when asked about their *Overall Westchester Community College Experience*. With regard to the *Quality of Instruction*, 97.1% reported being either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*.

Courses in Major: In evaluating courses in their major, the majority of respondents (96.7%) were either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*. This percentage is slightly higher than the previous year (94.7%).

Availability of Courses: This year, a slightly higher percentage (93.8%) expressed satisfaction with the *Availability of Courses*, than last year's graduating class (90.6%).

Goals met by College Degree: Over four-fifths of the graduates (84.5%) felt their goals were met by their college experience.

Evaluation of Student Services: In another series of questions, respondents were asked to rate their satisfaction with eighteen of the college's services. The services to which the students gave the most *very satisfied* responses were: *Computer Services* (74.9%), *Library Services* (72.4%), *Advising by Academic Faculty* (59.5%), *Reading and Math Skills Facilities* (59.0%), and *Tutorial Services* (55.0%).

Effectiveness of the College in Helping to Achieve Goals of Respondents: A large percentage of the respondents indicated that their goals had been met by their college experience.

Employment Goals: For the six questions exploring job-related goals, 88.1% of the respondents consistently indicated that Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve these goals.

Transfer Goals: Of the graduates who cited *Transferring to a Four-year Institution* as a major goal, 97.5% indicated that Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve this goal.

Academic Goals: The 2006 graduates were also asked a series of questions about their academic goals. Of the respondents, 82.4% rated Westchester Community College *very effective* in helping to achieve their goal of *Increased Desire and Ability to Learn* with another 15.1% rating it *somewhat effective*, for a total of 97.5%. Of the students who cited *Increased Knowledge and Understanding* as a goal, 82.1% rated Westchester Community College *very effective* and another 17.4% rated it *somewhat effective* for a total of 99.5%.

Personal Goals: Over two-thirds of the graduates considered achieving personal growth as a part of their reason for attending Westchester Community College. Of the eight sub-goals listed, 95.6% felt Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in *Developing Interest in New Ideas*, and 93.6% in *Improving Self-Image*.

The results of the survey are based on the responses of the 217 graduates, which represents almost 18.5% of the entire graduating class of 1,175 students. We are grateful to these students for their cooperation. The responses are a valuable tool for planning and assessment as Westchester Community College strives to provide quality services and instruction.

THE GRADUATES OF 2006

The 2006 Study of the Graduates of Westchester Community College provides information about the 2006 graduating class in three ways. First, it profiles the demographic, educational, and work-related characteristics of these graduates. Secondly, it compares these graduates to graduates in previous years to identify trends existing among our recent graduates. Thirdly, it provides the results of an evaluation by the graduates of the services and resources offered at Westchester Community College, along with an evaluation by the graduates of the effectiveness of Westchester Community College in helping them to achieve these goals. These evaluations are used by the faculty and administrators of the College for planning and assessment purposes.

METHODOLOGY

In Fall 2006, a survey (see Appendix 13) was sent to students who graduated from Westchester Community College either in the late summer of 2005, December 2005, or the spring of 2006, otherwise considered the graduating Class of 2006.

Of the 1,175 students who graduated in the Class of 2006 (1,058 with Associate degrees and 117 with certificates), a total of 217 returned a completed, usable survey. This yielded a sample size of 18.5%.

A comparison of the respondents to the known demographic characteristics of the entire 2006 graduating class shows similar percentages with regard to ethnic background, gender, and residence. For example, 59.0% of the respondents are White, while White students comprise 56.5% of the actual graduating class; 16.1% of the respondents are Black compared to 17.5% of the actual graduating class; and 13.4% of the respondents are Hispanic compared to 15.7% of the actual graduating class. With regard to gender, 30.9% of the respondents are male, while males comprised 40.9% of the actual 2006 graduating class. Additionally, 7.4% of the respondents live in the Bronx, while 8.3% of the actual class lived in the Bronx; over two-thirds (70.1%) of the respondents live in Westchester.

In certain instances, the total number of students responding to a question does not add up to the total number who returned the survey (217). This is due to the fact that some respondents failed to answer a question or responded to a question that was not applicable to their current status. In these cases, we have used the actual number of respondents.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF ENTIRE CLASS OF 2006

Gender: Almost three-fifths (59.1%) of the graduating class of 2006 are female, as shown in Table I. This represents a slight decrease from the previous year.


Age: Over one-fifth (21.6%) of the 2006 graduates were under twenty-two years of age at the time of graduation which was similar to the Class of 2005 (22.5%), as shown in Table I. The percentage of students graduating between the ages of twenty-two and twenty-nine increased from (43.0%) in 2005 to (49.2%) in 2006.

2006 GRADUATES BY AGE




Ethnic Background: As shown in Table II, over half of the graduates are White (56.5%), 17.5% are Black, 15.7% are Hispanic, and 4.6% are Asian/Pacific. The percentage of graduates who are classified as Non-Resident Aliens is 3.5%.

TABLE II: GRADUATES BY ETHNIC BACKGROUND


GRADUATES BY ETHNIC BACKGROUND – 2006



Degrees: Over two-fifths of the graduates (43.7%) received an AAS degree. The AAS degree continues to be the top degree awarded. Over one-quarter (30.8%) graduated with an AA degree, and approximately one-sixth (15.6%) received an AS degree. The percentage of students receiving a certificate degree has remained consistence at 10.0%.

TABLE III: GRADUATES BY DEGREE: 2002-2006




GRADUATES BY DEGREE: 2002-2006

EMPLOYMENT PROFILE OF 2006 GRADUATES

<u>Class of 2006</u>: Almost three-fourths (71.4%) of the 2006 graduates who responded reported being employed, as shown in Table IV. Of those employed, 71.0% reported being employed full-time and 29.0% employed part-time.

Location of employment: Of the respondents who reported the location of their employment, almost half (49.7% or 77 graduates) reported working in Westchester County. Less than one-fifth (12.3% or 19 graduates) reported working in New York State, but outside Westchester County, bringing the total percentage of those working in New York State to 62.0%. Another 9.0% reported working outside New York State. The work location of 29.0% of the respondents could not be determined.

Salary: The *mean salary (average)* for the 2006 graduates employed full-time was \$43,853. The median salary was \$35,000. Almost three-fourths of these graduates (71.0%) reported being either *very satisfied* (13.0%) or *somewhat satisfied* (58.0%) with their salary, as shown in Table V.

Job Satisfaction: More than four-fifths (85.9%) of the respondents also reported being either *very satisfied* (36.2%) or *somewhat satisfied* (49.7%) with their jobs, while 8.0% of the respondents reported being *somewhat dissatisfied* and another 6.1% reported being *very dissatisfied*, as shown in Table V below.

Opportunity to Advance: Over four-fifths (80.2%) of the respondents felt either very satisfied (42.5%) or somewhat satisfied (37.7%) with their opportunities for advancement. This is slightly lower than last year's graduates, where more than four-fifths (85.1%) respondents expressed some degree of satisfaction.

Westchester Community College's Impact on Employment: Over half (57.2%) of the respondents felt that *Finishing Their Degree* had been an important function in getting their current job. Of those who reported their employment status, 45.6% also felt that their *Specific Program of Study* was *important* to getting their current job.

A total of 70.6% of respondents reported that their current employment was to some degree related to their course of study. Over two-fifths (40.7%) of the employed respondents indicated that their current occupation was *highly related* to their program of study at the college, and almost one-third (29.9%) indicated that it was *slightly related*.

While one-third 29.3% indicated that their current job was *not related* to their program of study at the college, over three-fourths (76.5%) of the respondents felt that their Westchester Community College education prepared them for their current job either to a *great degree* (50.6%) or to a *slight degree* (25.9%).


<u>Class of 2006 Employment Status Compared to Previous Classes:</u> Considerable increase is seen in the mean beginning salary of the employed graduates when comparing the 2006 graduating class with previous year. The mean beginning salary increased to \$43,853, up from \$41,996 in 2005 and \$35,875 in 2002 as shown in Table VI.

The percentage of respondents working in Westchester County remains relatively stable at 49.7%.

LOCATION OF EMPLOYMENT: 2006





The Class of 2006 survey results show a lower percentage employed than the previous year. As shown in Table VII, 71.4% of the 2006 graduates reported being employed, compared to 79.5% in 2005. The percentage of those working full-time, decreased slightly from 73.7% in 2005 to 71.4% in 2006. The percentage still seeking employment increased from 4.7% in 2005 to 7.5% in 2006.

EDUCATION PROFILE OF 2006 GRADUATES

<u>Class of 2006</u>: Nearly three-fifths of the respondents (58.3%) or 126 graduates reported attending a college, university, or training program, as shown in Table VIII. Of these students, 73.8% reported attending full-time.

Demographic Characteristics of Those Attending College: Of the 2006 graduates who reported continuing their education, 71.4% were female; 60.3% were White; 14.3% were Black, and 12.7% were Hispanic, as shown in Table IX.

The College's Contribution to Achieving Transfer: The 2006 graduates consider Westchester Community College to have been very effective in assisting them to transfer. Of those respondents who indicated *transferring* was a goal, over three-fourths (76.9%) reported that the college was either *very effective* (60.8%) or *somewhat effective* (16.1%) in helping them to achieve their goal of transferring to a four-year institution.

When graduates were asked how well Westchester Community College prepared them for further study, over three-fourths (75.8%) indicated that they felt *well prepared*, and another 23.0% felt *somewhat prepared*. Very few (1.2% or only two graduates) reported feeling *unprepared*.

A large percentage reported being in a field of study either *highly related* (59.9%) or *slightly related* (25.9%) to their program of study at Westchester Community College. 14.2%, however, reported being in a field of study *not related or applicable* to their program of study at the college.

Four-Year College's Contribution to Affecting Transfer: The 2006 respondents were asked to rate the most important factors affecting their decision to transfer to a four-year college. The three factors with the highest percentage of respondents rating them *very important* were: *Availability of Program* (71.9%), *Location and Cost* (71.2%), and *Reputation of College* (62.8%). The least important factor was *Social Environment of College* (22.1%), as shown in Table X.


Future Educational Goals: A slightly higher percentage (87.5%) of the respondents who are continuing their education expect to earn a bachelor's degree or post baccalaureate degree at the completion of their studies than those in the previous year (85.9%), as shown in Table XI.

<u>Class of 2006 Higher Education Status Compared to Previous Classes:</u> A comparison of the 2006 graduates to the four previous classes with regard to continuing their education shows that the percentage who are continuing their education (58.3%) has increased from the previous year (56.0%). In addition, the percentage attending full-time decreased slightly – 73.8% this year compared to 74.0% last year.

STUDENT EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC EXPERIENCES

Overall Evaluation: Survey respondents continue to give positive feedback in their overall evaluation of the college, the faculty, and the courses they took in their major, as shown in Table XII. Of the 2006 graduates (98.1%) gave a very satisfied or satisfied response to their Overall Westchester Community College Experience and 97.1% gave a satisfied or better response to the Overall Quality of Instruction. A large percentage of the graduates (96.9%) also were satisfied or very satisfied with Library Services, and 96.7% were either satisfied or very satisfied with Courses Taken in Their Major.

Table XIII further breaks down the evaluations for the Class of 2006 into the more specific responses of *very satisfied*, *somewhat satisfied*, *somewhat dissatisfied*, and *very dissatisfied*. Over three-quarters (77.1%) of the respondents gave a *very satisfied* response to their *Overall Westchester Community College Experience*. Almost three-fourths (72.4%) of the respondents also were *very satisfied* with the *Library Services*.



Degree of Preparation for Further Study: Table XIV shows that of the respondents who evaluated the extent to which Westchester Community College had prepared them for further study, over three-fourths (75.8%) felt that they were *well prepared*. Another one-fifth (23.0%) felt *somewhat prepared* and 1.2% felt they were *not at all prepared*.

The evaluation by students of college services shows that the graduates were particularly positive about computer services. It received the highest percentage of *very satisfied* responses (74.9%). Library Services (72.4%), Advising by Academic Faculty (59.5%), Reading and Math Skills Facilities (59.0%), Tutorial Services (55.0%), and Registration (53.4%), also received high percentages of *very satisfied* responses.

Those services receiving the greatest percentage of *very dissatisfied* responses were Cafeteria Food Services (9.4%), Job/Career Services (9.3%), Financial Aid (8.2%), and Admission Services (6.9%).

In terms of usage, the services reported being used by the most respondents were Advising by Academic Faculty (96.2%), Admissions Services (95.7%), and Registration (94.9%). The services reported used by the least number of respondents were Health Services (39.9%), Job/Career Services (50.3%), Financial Aid (57.5%), and Counseling Services (60.4%).


EFFECTIVENESS IN STUDENT GOAL ATTAINMENT

Westchester Community College graduates were asked what best describes their most important reason for earning a college degree. Table XVI shows that almost one-half (48.5%) of the 2006 respondents selected *To Increase Their Chances of Job Placement or Advancement*. Over one-fourth (28.2%) chose *To Prepare to Transfer to a Four-Year College*, and over one-fifth (23.3%) selected *To Reach Other Goals Such As Self-Fulfillment*.

The graduates were also asked to evaluate how effective Westchester Community College has been in helping them to reach goals in four areas: (1) Academic Goals, (2) Career Goals, (3) Personal Goals, and (4) Social/Cultural Goals. The following is a synopsis of the results in each area.

Academic Goals

Goal of Increased Knowledge: Table XVII shows that on each of the six questions exploring the success of the college in helping graduates to achieve their academic goals, at least ninety percent indicated on each sub-goal that Westchester Community College had been either very effective or somewhat effective in helping them.

Transfer Goals: Table XVIII shows that 77.1% felt that Westchester Community College had been *very effective* in helping them to *Transfer to a Four-Year Institution*.

The graduates also were asked how effective the college had been in helping them to achieve their goal of *Meeting Professional or Graduate School Requirements*. Of those who consider it a goal 77.6% felt Westchester Community College had been *very effective* in doing so, as shown in Table XVIII.

Personal Growth: Table XX lists the personal growth objectives to which the respondents gave the highest percentages of *very effective* responses. The top three were Developing an Interest in New Ideas (67.6%), Improving Self-Confidence (66.2%), and Develop a Sense of Responsibility (64.5%). Learning to Participate Effectively in a Community (52.5%) received the lowest percentage of very effective responses.

Social and Cultural Goals

Of the graduates who included cultural and social enrichment as goals for attending Westchester Community College, *Appreciation of Art and Architecture* received the highest percentage of *very effective* ratings (40.3%) followed by *Involvement in Social Activities* (36.1%), *Appreciation of Theater* (29.9%), and *Involvement in Political Activities* (24.4%). Respondents felt that the college was least effective in supporting *Appreciation of Musical Performance* (22.3%) as shown in Table XXI.


