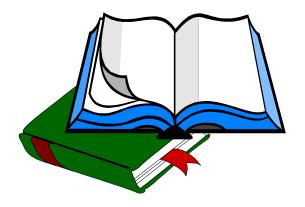

### **MISSION STATEMENT:**

The mission of the Westchester Community College is to provide and foster life-long learning for the residents of the County. Through credit and non-credit courses and programs leading to an Associate Degree or college certificate, the College provides (at convenient on-and off-campus locations) high-quality, affordable, comprehensive education to meet the career, transfer, vocational, remedial and recreational needs of the Westchester community. It seeks to be accessible, community centered, comprehensive, adaptable and dedicated to life-long learning.

### **ACHIEVEMENTS:**

- Westchester Community College ranks among the 30 community colleges in the SUNY system: sixth in total credit student enrollments, and first in non-credit enrollments. We had a Fall 2007 headcount of 12,073 students in credit classes, and 15,532 in non-credit courses.
- Diversity of the student body: Approximately 56% of the total credit student body is female, and 45% are minority. In the Fall of 2006, students enrolled at WCC were from 58 other countries.
- Colleges to which Westchester Community College students have successfully transferred include SUNY
  4-year institutions, CUNY, all the other colleges in Westchester County, and to Bernard Baruch College,
  John Jay College, Quinnipiac University, Hunter College, Cornell University, New York University, Mount
  Holyoke College, Fordham University, Columbia University, Skidmore and Johnson and Wales.
- The percentage of 2006 graduates who reported transferring to a four year college was 58%
- Of the 2006 graduates responding to the annual graduate survey, 71.4% of the respondents were employed either full-time (71.0%) or part-time (29.0%). Of those employed, 50% were employed in Westchester County and another 12.3% in New York State, but outside the County. They work for virtually all major corporations, small businesses, government, hospitals, etc. in the County.
- Average salary earned by first-time employees, full-time in a new job, six months after graduation from the College: approximately \$43,853. The median salary was \$35,000.
- The College is continuing to help DSS clients with securing jobs, skills enhancement and other services which lead to self-sufficiency. For the past 5 years, the program retention and job placement upgrade rates averages from 67% to 70%.
- Number of programs of study at the College: 35 Degree programs granting an Associate Degree, and 21 certificate programs.

- The Harold L. Drimmer Library is the focal point for the information and research needs of students, faculty, staff and administrators, and is open to the general Westchester County Community. The library's resources and services range from Media, to print and electronic books, subscription databases that include full-text newspaper and magazine articles to virtual reference services and online course materials. Due to our resource-sharing partnerships with SUNY and WALDO, we are able to provide extensive interlibrary loan services. Users can also search for resources in the Westchester County and the New York Public Library System.
- The Distance Learning program continues to grow with increasing numbers of students enrolled, faculty
  involved and courses offered in the online format. At present, students can obtain a certificate in Computer
  Programming and a Liberal Arts Social Science associate's degree online.
- Development and implementation of a comprehensive institutional effectiveness plan for the assessment of student learning.
- Submission and approval by SUNY of the following Strengthened Campus-Based General Education Assessment plans with no revision:
  - -Critical Thinking
  - -Mathematics
  - -Basic Communications
- The College's physical plant consists of 218 acres which includes 21 buildings, approximately 25 acres of parking lots and approximately 22.7 acres of athletic fields. All our public facilities are handicapped accessible, and we continually seek improvements through our capital projects planning and implementation.
- In addition to the lovely 218 acre campus, 30 off-campus sites offer courses to both credit and non-credit students. Since 1970, the College has offered classes in over 39 public schools from Yorktown to Yonkers, approximately 110 organizations in the For Profit, Not-for-Profit and Government Sectors, 53 civic associations from the American Red Cross to the Yorktown Chamber of Commerce, in over 18 public libraries from Armonk to Yonkers, in 4 penitentiaries, in 26 hospitals, and in 19 nursing homes. Accessibility is our watchword.
- The public uses the College facilities for more than just courses. Last year over 325,000 individuals used the facilities for meetings from the American Red Cross Association's "Lifeguard Training", the BOCES "Young Authors Conference", and "Special Education Conference", to the Westchester/Putnam "ACTSO Kickoff", to the NYS Code Enforcement Training Program, to the Theodore Young Community Center Summer Day Camp, to the "Hate Crime Education Workshop" sponsored by the Asian Society, to the NYS Department of Transportation's "Fall Safety Conference," to the Volunteer Center of United Way's "Leadership Westchester Conference," to seminars sponsored by the Rockland Economic Development Center, to meetings of the Westchester Municipal Officials Association, to environmental seminars sponsored by the Westchester Chemical Society, to the Tri-County Basketball Playoffs, to the Westchester County Department of Health's many provider-training workshops, to meetings of the Westchester Photographic Society, to meetings of the Women's Enterprise Development Center, to the Westchester County Association's planning meeting, to the Hudson Valley Blood Services Fall/Spring/Summer Blood Drives, to the American Heart Association's "Basic CPR Training", to the SUNY Board Conference", to the White Plains Recreation Department's soccer practices and games, to meetings of the Westchester Putnam Chapter of the Retired Public Employees Association, SUNY Chancellors Scholar Athletes Awards American Women of African Descent Conference, New York State Notary Public Exams, "SCORE" Annual Board Meeting, Women's Leadership Conference, NYS Board of Regents Public Hearing, and many others.
- The College is providing 600 non-credit continuing education/community services courses in Spring 2008
  excluding computer and ESL classes. Everything from Real Estate Licensing to Walking Tours of the Old
  Croton Aqueduct is offered.

- At the close of the fiscal year on August 31, 2007, the Westchester Community College Foundation raised a total of \$2.5 million in scholarships and general funds and another \$2.1 million for the Gateway Center Campaign. Also, the Foundation awarded \$1 million in scholarships to 900 students. The Foundation's Volunteer Corp continued to expand and ended the year with 325 active volunteers.
- Westchester Community College Foundation ranks second among 30 SUNY Community Colleges and 10<sup>th</sup> among the 64 Colleges and Universities in fund raising.
- Westchester Community College Foundation provides support for scholarships, emergency student aid, faculty professional development, faculty and staff Excellence Awards, subsidies for students' children enrolled in the Virginia Marx Children Center and other initiatives at the college.
- The Office of College Community Relations continued to expand the College's website and to conduct print, electronic media, advertising and public relations campaigns, as well as maintaining the College's Speakers Bureau.
- The Virginia Marx Children's Center provides a lab and demonstration site which accommodates approximately 12-14 WCC students each semester in credit bearing courses from Early Childhood and Dietetic Technology departments.
- TRIO/Student Support Programs, a federal grant program providing counseling, tutoring and skill development workshops for academically at risk students who are low income, first generation and/or disabled continues to serve at least 160 participants annually. Eighty-six percent of the first year participants returned to WCC for a second year, thirty-one percent of the participants graduated and transferred to a four year college within 3 years, Fifty-eight percent did so in four years and approximately ninety percent were in good academic standing as defined by the College.
- The Office of Counseling and Student Development initiated National Honor Society Chi Aloha Epsilon for students who begin their education enrolled in developmental courses. They inducted 20 students in Fall, 2007 and will induct 55 students in Spring, 2008.
- The Career and Transfer Center received \$94,000 from the Department of Labor to implement an internship program.
- EOC provided academic and vocational training and support services to a total of 775 low income County residents.
- EOC continued to provide Certified Nurses Aide (CNA) Training in two off-site locations. A CNA program
  was offered in Peekskill in collaboration with the Department of Labor. A VESOL (Vocational English for
  Speakers of Other Languages) CNA Program was offered in Spring Valley in partnership with Konbit Nég
  Lakay, a Haitian Community service organization.
- EOC became an official GED Test Site under the sponsorship of the New York State Education Department. It is estimated that EOC will test approximately 1,000 individuals annually.
- EOC established an Employment Services Unit to better respond to the workforce preparation and job
  placement needs of low income students. In addition to providing job search assistance and ongoing
  support with resume development, EOC created job readiness workshops and extended services and
  support to students at offsite locations in Spring Valley and Peekskill. Employer outreach was also
  expanded to increase opportunities for student employment, internships, and strategic partnerships to aid in
  the development of curricula.
- Through a partnership with the Westchester County Office of Workforce Investment and Westchester Community Opportunity Program, tax preparation services were provided at the EOC to low income individuals under the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Program. As of the writing of this report, 371 returns were filed and a total of \$885,075 was claimed in federal and state refunds. The average refund was of \$1,940. This initiative also helped 147 seniors who live in public housing in Yonkers to obtain payments under the Economic Stimulus Act.

- With the assistance of the Office of College Community Relations, EOC created a website and developed new marketing materials to appeal to a broader underserved audience.
- The collaboration between EOC and the Westchester County Department of Social Services was expanded
  to enable a greater number of public assistance recipients to participate in developmental, academic and
  vocational training programs at the EOC. During the 07-08 academic year, the number of public assistance
  recipients participating in training nearly tripled.
- A new life skills initiative was developed for EOC's Bridge participants, most of whom are members of families who receive public assistance. This initiative was designed to enhance the participants' job readiness and employment retention and will be fully implemented in 2008-09.
- EOC partnered with the New York Blood Center to conduct a successful Blood Drive in Yonkers; helping to raise awareness of the need for donations from the urban community.
- EOC offered a financial management course, Financing Your Independence (FYI), to teach students and community residents the basics about banking services, money management, savings, investing, credit and more. The FYI Program is sponsored by Citigroup and administered centrally by the State University enrolling 285 students.
- EOC continued its speaker series to address issues of concern to the school and general community. The Center sponsored workshops on parenting, building self-esteem and stress reduction.
- A Black male student success initiative was recently created by the College to assist these students, increase their retention and program completion rates at WCC.
- The College is a leading partner in the County's Workforce Investment Act program. The College had approximately 89 WIA funded students on campus last year. In addition, WCC's Professional Development Center, through its contract training and its administration of the Academy for Entrepreneurial Excellence, worked with employees from approximately 36 companies.
- The College, through the Cisco Networking Academy, is offering not only the CCNA, but the next level
  certification CCNP (Cisco Certified Network Professional), both Cisco security certifications, Voice over IP
  training, and Cisco courses for A+ Certification and Server+ certification as well as the Panduit Certified
  Installer certification.
- The ELI served over 4,300 enrollments this year including students enrolled at our four hub extension centers: Ossining, Peekskill, Yonkers/Cross County, and Mount Vernon, as well as six other locations including Mt. Kisco, Port Chester and New Rochelle. Forty percent of ESL enrollments are at extension locations.
- One hundred and ten computer labs are located throughout the College's main campus and extension sites supporting all academic programs, which provides MAC's and Pentium-class PC's for student use.
- The College enrolled approximately 1030 students in the fourth year of its ESL programs at the New Rochelle and White Plains Public Libraries.
- In cooperation with the Balance of Westchester/Putnam One Stop Employment center, the Professional Development Center provided an ESL program for Stew Leonard's, one of the area's most recognized names in food shopping. Our ESL program was in complete alignment with Stew Leonard's customer focused philosophy.
- Westchester Community College was selected as one of the training providers for a Contextualized English Language grant. Westchester Community College will develop and implement contextualized curriculum for employees of five Westchester companies and will develop curriculum for two other Hudson Valley community colleges who are also participating in this grant. The Balance of Westchester/Putnam LWIB is the lead agency for this grant.

- Westchester Community College is partnering with Norwalk Community College and Housatonic Community College in the development of a proposal to respond to a WIRED grant opportunity. This initiative will provide funding for organizations in Westchester, Putnam Counties, city of Yonkers, and Fairfield County to create and implement transformative, sustainable initiatives in a variety of workforce development areas.
- The College participated in a national study sponsored by the Council of Adult and Experimental Learning, designed to assess our services and programs for adult learners.
- The Westchester Art Workshop expanded its pre-college arts program to include a special series of
  portfolio development classes to support County secondary school juniors and seniors preparing for college
  admission and employment.
- The Westchester Art Workshop is a featured partner in July 08' "All Fired Up" Ceramic Institute for Teachers.
- Westchester Art Workshop developed and held a special program for the Girl Scouts of America.
- From the Fall 2007 to Summer 2008 Westchester Art Workshop will have offered 390 credit classes in the
  visual arts taught by more than 50 professional artist faculty members, making this one of the most
  diversified public art programs in Westchester County.
- From fall 2007 to Summer 2008 Westchester Art Workshop will have served a total of 4,200 enrollees through its credit courses.
- The Summer camp youth program is expecting to enroll 300 youths attending classes in Mixed Media, Painting and Drawing, Jewelry, Cartooning Animation, and Photography (for 6 to 16 year olds).
- Organized four large in-house student and faculty art shows for the public displaying thousands of artworks in White Plains Gallery.
- Developed a special open house event at Ward Pound Ridge Reservation in partnership with the Westchester County Parks Department to present "Contemporary Landscapes", and exhibition of paintings by WAW students.
- Developed a Summer two month long Ceramic Exhibition and education event, with lectures and an
  opportunity for students to participate in a wood firing ceramic event in Cold Spring, NY at the artist's studio.
- Enrollment in the Mainstream Program for Older Adults' Collegium Program continues to be very strong approximately 135 members each semester.
- Mainstream, the Institute for Mature Adults, has been awarded three grants. The first, a grant from the Coleman Foundation, in collaboration with the Women's Enterprise Development Center, has allowed us to successfully complete 3 cycles of Small Business Training for older adults. The second is a grant from the United Way/Benedict Foundation which has allowed us to successfully continue our second year of a comprehensive intergenerational wellness initiative in Mount Vernon. The third, from the Benedict Foundation, has provided funds to augment the Small Business Training program for older adults.
- Non-credit professional development computing program enrollments at the Yonkers extension center grew by 62% between Fall 2006 and Fall 2007. English as a Second Language (ESL) course enrollments grew by 54% and 50% between 2006-2007 and 2007-2008 respectively.
- The Professional Development Center assisted in the design and implementation of a leadership academy for the Westchester County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation. In addition, the Professional Development Center offered training workshops to employees at the Westchester Medical Center. The Professional Development Center also worked with Westchester County Airport to help them with the rapid growth of volume at the airport. PDC has thus far provided team building, supervisory skills, and customer service training with excellent results.

- The Professional Development Center received approximately \$3,000 in scholarships from Northwestern Mutual Financial Network for students in The Academy for Entrepreneurial Excellence.
- Through the College's Professional Development Center, 281 sections of non-credit computer courses
  were, or are, being offered during the 2007-08 academic year both at the main campus and at five
  extension locations. New courses include Advanced QuickBooks, Performing Payroll in QuickBooks, Web
  Programming in HTML, and an upgrade of all MS Office training courses to Office 2007.
- The Professional Development Center developed and conducted training for Older Youth in Work Readiness and Microsoft Office Skills in partnership with the Peekskill Youth Bureau. Students received training to prepare them to take the National Work Readiness Credential exam.
- The Professional Development Center expanded the number of online courses in Project Management offered in partnership with Cheetah Learning. In addition, we are offering an intensive in-person course in Summer 08 for individuals who are preparing to take the Project Management Professional certification exam from PMI.
- Enrollment in online courses offered in partnership with Education to Go increased 25% in 2007 over 2006. The number of online course offerings in partnership with Gatlin Education Services was also expanded.
- CW Brown, one of the county's successful contractors, hired the Professional Development Center to do a blueprint reading course. Charlie Brown, the owner, is a graduate of PDC's Academy for Entrepreneurial Excellence.
- Credit enrollments at the Yonkers Cross County extension center grew by 30% between Fall 2006 and Fall 2007, and grew by 28% between Spring 2007 and Spring 2008.
- The Ossining Extension Center continues to expand its summer youth Science Academy for ages 8-16. The Summer Program includes academies in science, games and puzzles, leadership and reading.
- The Professional Development Center received approximately \$32,000 in SUNY grant funding to provide training to employees of two Westchester companies.
- Mt. Vernon Extension Center has established a "Healthy Eating" partnership with the Mount Vernon Public Schools and Department of Senior Services which will reach all of Mount Vernon 5<sup>th</sup> grade students.
- Combined credit enrollments for the Fall 2007 and Spring 2008 semesters for Mount Vernon Extension Center were just shy of 2,764 representing a 25.5% increase from the previous academic year.
- The Peekskill Extension Center has greatly increased its non-credit activity through new course development and partnerships with the colleges Professional Development Center.
- The Peekskill Extension Center has renewed its partnership with the City of Peekskill School District on the LEAP (Learning Enrichment Activities Program) initiative. The Center has provided after-school arts technology enrichment for local at-risk middle school youth since 2003.
- Community Services partners with numerous area restaurants to bring "A Taste of Westchester" to the community, with over 600 participants in 2006-2007.
- The ACE Advanced College Experience Program offered college classes in the high schools. Fiftyeight classes were offered in 2007-2008 at 21 different high schools, with over 1100 students enrolled.

- Project Transition is the Displaced Homemaker Retraining Center for Westchester and Putnam Counties.
  We serve County residents who have been widowed, divorced or separated, who are single parents, or
  whose spouse has become disabled or permanently unemployed. Last year, we provided training to 170
  county residents. The program is funded by the New York State Department of Labor Office of Workforce
  Investment and provides over 100 hours of training in computer skills and career strategies for individuals
  who qualify.
- Community Services continued to partner with the Hauxia Chinese School to offer Chinese language and culture classes to American children of Chinese descent; over 450 children and adults were served in 2006-2007.
- The College continues to offer Lifelong Learning courses in Somers. Enrollments continue to grow and course offerings are diverse.
- Community Services received a grant from the NYS Developmental and Disabilities Council to provide training to the community, designed to increase special education knowledge in parents, teachers and administrators.
- A variety of programs, both credit and non-credit, continue to be developed to address issues of concern about Homeland Security and provide training as appropriate.
- Our extension site in Port Chester Middle School, offering credit and ESL classes, continues to grow and has expanded to offer classes four nights per week.
- The Liaison Program has been expanded to provide faculty oversight of college courses offered by high school faculty in the ACE Program.
- The Information Technology Department continues to enhance its disaster recovery capabilities. We are now mirroring all our mission critical data to a secondary location on campus. Plans are in place to add a larger underground fuel tank for the Datacenter generator, which will extend the length of time the generator can provide power without refueling, and replace the back-up air conditioner.
- The Information Technology Department completed the roll out of Microsoft Office 2007. The new user
  interface and the additional features will enable users to be more productive and decrease the demand on
  the Helpdesk and Technical Services.
- The College received approval from SUNY to offer a new degree program in Teacher Education Transfer Program in Childhood Education Information Security and Forensics.

### **NEW INITIATIVES FOR 2008/2009**

- All of the extension centers are planning for growth in both credit and non-credit enrollments.
- The College continues to work with The Westchester Business Council of Westchester to offer a joint
  program for small business owners called The Academy for Entrepreneurial Excellence. In addition
  together we have created a successor program entitled "Executive Level", designed for higher level leaders.
- The English Language Institute Runs 7 days a week with a growing Sunday program. ESL Courses are available at 11 extension locations.
- The College through its Extension Site Task Force plans to continue to bring more academic and student support services to our extension students, and to explore new ways to support all locations.
- Gateway Center construction began in Fall, 2008. Construction is on target for its completion in 2009-2010.
- The Westchester Community College Foundation will continue its fundraising activities in the community throughout the year.
- The College will continue to explore with Westchester School Districts new partnerships that address the critical issues of under prepared youth and adults.
- The Distance Learning Program will be building on its initial success and will continue expanding its
  offerings for the 2008-2009 academic year.
- The Student Affairs Office added another day of new student and parent orientation bringing the total to three days. A spring semester student and parent orientation will be held for the first time during the Spring, 2009 term.
- Jobstar is entering into its 19<sup>th</sup> annual contract with the Department of Social services serving TANF eligible county residents.
- Jobstar will continue to offer Weekend Academy for children (6-14) of adults attending the Saturday program.
- Jobstar has entered an agreement with the Department of Corrections offering ServSAFE Certification Class and an academic, non-credit workshop with incarcerated men.
- College Information Technology is continuing the process of expanding its wireless network for student laptop use throughout the campus.
- College Information Technology will continue to create technology-enhanced "Smart Classrooms" on the campus.
- EOC will develop a core curriculum to ensure that all students receive basic academic skills, computer literacy and financial literacy instruction. It will also incorporate workforce preparation into the core curriculum.
- EOC will continue to offer Earned Income Tax Credit tax preparation services to low income community residents in partnership with the Westchester County Office of Workforce Investment.
- EOC will develop and implement a comprehensive College Connections Program to "plant the seed" in the
  minds of underserved individuals that college is desirable and attainable, with the necessary preparation.
  The program will offer information about college admissions, financial aid, career planning, etc. and will
  include college tours, academic and career advisement, workshops for parents, and myriad opportunities
  for personal development.

- Targeting recent high school graduates and students who earned a GED, EOC will implement the restructured College Prep Academy to help students develop the skills they need to enter college and to successfully perform college level work. As part of this effort, EOC will establish a stronger linkage with the campus and with other area colleges to provide academic support to college students who dropped/stopped out of school for academic reasons and to facilitate the enrollment of EOC graduates into college.
- Through the Employment Services Unit, EOC will revamp its World of Work initiative to improve the students' likelihood of success in a changing economy. The Employment Services Unit will also initiate a series of "guest lectures" by business professionals to provide greater insights to students about employer expectations, workplace culture, employment barriers, etc.
- EOC will explore the development and implementation of a Culinary Arts Program in collaboration with a community based organization in Yonkers.
- A student retention model will be developed at EOC to increase completion and graduation rates.
- All CRT monitors at the EOC will be replaced with energy-efficient LCD models, in compliance with the college and county's green initiatives. All computers will be Vista-compatible.
- In an effort to improve student learning and performance outcomes in targeted programs, EOC will review, upgrade and contextualize curricula, as needed.
- The library will expand electronic resources, enhance its liaison program, and provide virtual reference and instructional services.
- As per directives from the Secretary of Education and SUNY, the College continues to develop a Pademic Preparedness Plan.
- The Student Personnel Services Division will increase its services to students with mental health issues and students who are differently-abled.
- Westchester Art Workshop has joined with nine other major cultural institutions in the county, including the Neuberger Museum of Art, the Katonah Museum of Art, the Hudson River Museum of Art, and the Westchester Arts Council among others, to develop what will be the largest multi site exhibition and educational event in Westchester County in Fall 2008.
- Westchester Art Workshop is developing an after school art program for the Tarrytown School District that will include instruction in Painting and Drawing, Ceramics, and Computer Animation.
- In Partnership with the National Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship, and the Mount Vernon Youth Bureau, Mount Vernon Extension Center will offer a 6 week intensive Summer Entrepreneurship Academy for Mount Vernon Youth.
- The College continues to explore several potential programs in such areas as Dental Hygiene and Veterinary Technologist.
- Community Services in conjunction with SUNY Youth Sports Institute, now offers over 100 youth coaches certification training.
- The English Language Institute has partnered with Neighbors Link in Mt. Kisco, a CBO providing various services to immigrants and is providing high quality English language training for their clients.

- The English Language Institute (ELI) will begin collaboration with the Jacob Burns Film Center in summer, 2008 in which ELI students will build English skills through "Digital Story Telling".
- The College will continue to implement the 2003-2008 Five-Year Strategic Plan after a two year process of identifying new goals and tracking continuing goals and developing specification plans for recommendation of cabinet support.
- The College will continue to develop its academic assessment endeavors in General Education and the Program Review of individual curricula using the SUNY Academic Assessment Initiative guidelines.
- The College is expanding its innovative scheduling of credit classes, to better serve adult students who
  work or have other obligations: Friday nights and Sundays at the Ossining Center, and 7 week accelerated
  course Saturday at Yonkers/Cross County.
- The Yonkers Extension Center will be moving from its current location in the Cross County Shopping Center due to mall renovations. It is expected that it will be relocated to another location in the mall.
- In partnership with Gatlin Educational Services, the Yonkers Cross County Center will continue to offer noncredit online certification training in MCSE, MCSA, A+, Network+/Server+, and Security.
- Continuing Education will work on forming an Institute for Public Safety which will coordinate several existing programs and develop new ones.
- In the coming year the Information Technology Department will be upgrading the PC operating system to Windows Vista. This is a huge undertaking given the complexity of the College computing environment and the extensive depth and breadth of our software library.
- Information Technology will continue working to streamline our Microsoft security patch and virus scan management. Within the last year upgrades to our desktop management and virus scan software have enabled us to apply patches and Microsoft Office and virus updates without user intervention.
- The Information Technology Department is investigating a new Helpdesk/Inventory system to replace our discontinued Infra-Center system. The integrated Helpdesk/Asset Management system will be integrated to the operation of the Helpdesk and Technical Services.
- The College Information Technology Department will continue to develop web based applications to simplify and enhance our students' experience with our academic/administrative process.
- Phase 2 of the Peoplesoft Implementation plan will be launched. This phase will provide a comprehensive Web Based Student/Academic Information System as well as upgrade existing Financial and Human Resource systems.

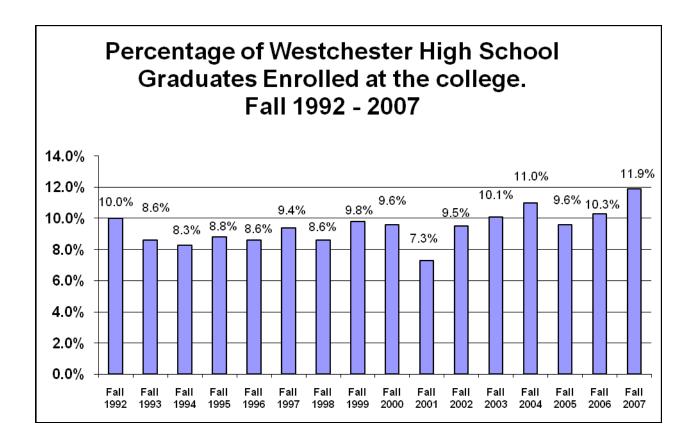

### **FALL 2004 COHORT**

Under the guidelines set forth by the federal *Student Right to Know Act*, the graduation rate for first-time, full-time, degree-seeking students in the Fall 2004 at Westchester Community College is **13.8%**.

The success rate for students recognizes that many students come to the community college with the intent of transferring before degree completion or may take longer to graduate. With these factors in mind, the success rate for the fall 2004 cohort is **53.6%**.

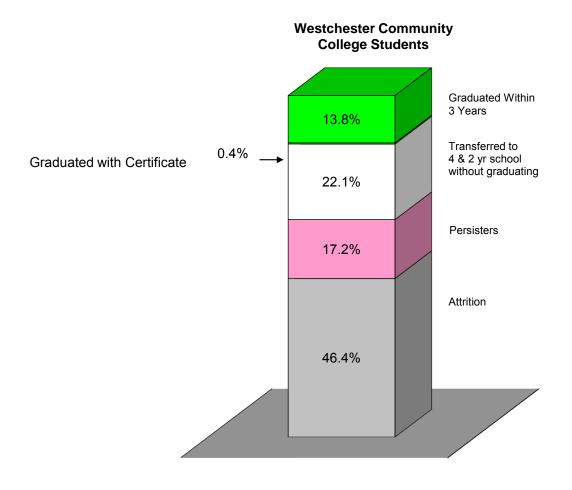
