Dear Friends,

We are pleased to present this report on our 2009 graduating class. The 1,207 students who received degrees were drawn from all six cities and 19 towns in Westchester County and reflect closely the demographic characteristics of the county in terms of gender and ethnic background.

Our graduates are continuing their education at 44 colleges throughout the United States. Almost three-fifths (58.3%) of the respondents transferred to a four-year college, and three-fourths (75.6%) are attending full-time.

Two-thirds (64.6%) of the respondents also are employed either full-time or part-time. They are employed by 74 different companies in Westchester County; another 25 companies in New York State, but outside the county; and an additional 4 firms located in other states. The mean salary for those holding full-time jobs was \$37,696. The median salary was \$27,000.

The evaluation by the graduates of the college and the services it provides continues to remain high. In evaluating the *Overall Quality of Instruction* at Westchester Community College, 95.0% were either *very satisfied* (71.4%) or *satisfied* (23.6%). With regard to their *Overall College Experience*, 96.1% were either *very satisfied* (75.6%) or *satisfied* (20.5%).

The accomplishments of our graduates are a great source of pride to us. We believe you will share these feelings as you read this report.

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### APPENDICES

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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The graduates of Westchester Community College who responded to the 2009 Graduate Survey reported an increase in salaries over the graduates of previous years. The mean salary for those employed full-time is \$37,696, down by \$6,000 from the previous year (\$43,696). Over two-thirds (64.6%) reported being employed after six months, which is higher than the previous year's graduating class (61.1%).

**Employment:** The 2009 graduates continued to feel positive about their jobs.

**Satisfaction with Job:** Over four-fifths (80.4%) of the graduates who responded were either *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their jobs, and over three-fourths (76.1%) also were either *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their *Opportunity to Advance*. Almost three-fourths (72.7%) further felt that their education at the college prepared them for their current job either *to a great degree* or *to a slight degree*.

**Location of Employment:** Almost three-fourths (73.6%) of the 2009 graduates who reported being employed were employed in New York State. Over half (55.6%) of the graduates who reported they were employed in Westchester C1ounty. Another 18.0% of the graduates were employed outside Westchester, but inside New York State, while 3.0% found employment outside the state. The location of employment for 23.3% could not be determined.

**Education:** The percentage of the graduates who reported that they transferred to a four-year college decreased slightly this year, with 58.3% of the graduates reporting they had transferred to a four-year college compared to 61.5% of the 2008 graduates.

Attending College Full-Time: Of the respondents who reported continuing their education, three-fourths 75.6% reported attending college *full-time*. This is a slight increase from last year's class (73.0%).

**Degree Aspirations:** As in previous years, a high percentage of the respondents (81.9%) intend to obtain a bachelor's degree or even a post baccalaureate degree. This percentage is slightly higher than the previous year's percentage of 80.5%.

**Factors Facilitating Transfer:** Responses to a set of questions exploring factors important to facilitating student transfers showed that the ones considered *very important* by the largest percentage of respondents are: *Availability of Program Desired* (80.5%), *Location and Cost* (75.4%), and *Reputation of College* (69.3%).

**Demographic Characteristics:** A review of the demographic characteristics of the entire Class of 2009 reveals some slight changes from previous graduating classes.

**Gender:** The percentage of female graduates decreased slightly from 59.2% in 2008 to 58.5% in 2009.

**Ethnic Background:** The percentage of Black graduates (18.5%) increased slightly compared to last year's class (16.1%), while the percentage of Hispanics increased to 20.7% from 20.6%.

**Age:** The percentage of students graduating under the age of twenty-two (16.0%) decreased over last year's class (23.1%). The percentage of graduates in the 22 to 29 age group (52.7% in 2009) increased compared to 48.1% in 2008.

**<u>Reasons for Attending:</u>** Over half (50.5%) of the survey respondents reported that their major reason for attending Westchester Community College was to *Increase My Chances to Get a Specific Job or a Better Job*. Slightly over one-third (30.8%) did so in order to transfer to a four-year institution. The remaining sixth (18.7%) did so to *Reach Other Goals Such As Self-fulfillment*.

**Evaluation of College Experience:** The respondents to the survey continue to give a positive response on several broad questions concerning Westchester Community College.

**Overall College Experience:** As in previous years, the overwhelming majority (96.1%) of the 2009 graduates were either *very satisfied* or *satisfied* when asked about their *Overall Westchester Community College Experience*. With regard to the *Quality of Instruction*, 98.6% reported being either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*.

**Courses in Major:** In evaluating courses in their major, the majority of respondents (98.0%) were either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*. This percentage is lower than the previous year (99.6%).

**Availability of Courses:** This year, a higher percentage (99.6%) expressed satisfaction with the *Availability of Courses*, than last year's graduating class (98.7%).

**Goals met by College Degree:** Over three-fourths of the graduates (79.1%) felt their goals were met by their college experience.

**Evaluation of Student Services:** In another series of questions, respondents were asked to rate their satisfaction with 18 of the college's services. The services to which the students gave the most *very satisfied* responses were: *Library Services* (71.4%), *Computer Services* (66.1%), *Reading and Math Skills Facilities* (65.5%), and *Advising by Academic Faculty* (59.6%).

**Effectiveness of the College in Helping to Achieve Goals of Respondents:** A large percentage of the respondents indicated that their goals had been met by their college experience.

- **Employment Goals:** For the six questions exploring job-related goals, almost ninety percent of the respondents consistently indicated that Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve these goals.
- **Transfer Goals:** Of the graduates who cited *Transferring to a Four-year Institution* as a major goal, 95.3% indicated that Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve this goal.
- Academic Goals: The 2009 graduates were also asked a series of questions about their academic goals. Of the students who cited *Increased Knowledge and Understanding* as a goal, 75.2% rated Westchester Community College *very effective* and another 23.3% rated it *somewhat effective* for a total of 98.5%. Of the 2009 respondents, 74.1% rated Westchester Community College *very effective* in helping to achieve their goal of *Increased Desire and Ability to Learn* with another 21.4% rating it *somewhat effective*, for a total of 95.5%.
- **Personal Goals:** Majority of our graduates considered achieving personal growth as a part of their reason for attending Westchester Community College. Of the eight sub-goals listed, 97.9% felt Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in *Develop Interest in New Ideas* and 96.2% in *Develop a Sense of Responsibility*.

The results of the survey are based on the responses of the 206 graduates, which represents almost 17.1% of the entire graduating class of 1,207 students. We are grateful to these students for their cooperation. The responses are a valuable tool for planning and assessment as Westchester Community College strives to provide quality services and instruction.

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#### THE GRADUATES OF 2009

The 2008-2009 Study of the Graduates of Westchester Community College provides information about the 2009 graduating class in three ways. First, it profiles the demographic, educational, and work-related characteristics of these graduates. Secondly, it compares these graduates to graduates in previous years to identify trends existing among our recent graduates. Thirdly, it provides the results of an evaluation by the graduates of the services and resources offered at Westchester Community College, along with an evaluation by the graduates of the effectiveness of Westchester Community College in helping them to achieve these goals. These evaluations are used by the faculty and administrators of the College for planning and assessment purposes.

#### METHODOLOGY

In Fall 2009, a survey (see Appendix 13) was sent to students who graduated from Westchester Community College either in the late summer of 2008, December 2008, or the spring of 2009, otherwise considered the graduating Class of 2009.

Of the 1,207 students who graduated in the Class of 2009 (1,056 with Associate degrees and 151 with certificates); a total of 206 returned a completed, usable survey. This yielded a sample size of 17.1%.

A comparison of the respondents to the known demographic characteristics of the entire 2009 graduating class shows similar percentages with regard to ethnic background, gender, and residence. For example, 48.2% of the respondents are White, while White students comprise 50.2% of the actual graduating class; 18.6% of the respondents are Black compared to 18.5% of the actual graduating class; and 19.8% of the respondents are Hispanic compared to 20.7% of the actual graduating class. With regard to gender, 34.8% of the respondents are male, while males comprised 41.5% of the actual graduating class and 65.2% of the respondents are female, while female comprised 58.5% of the actual 2009 graduating class. Almost three-fourths (73.3%) of the respondents live in Westchester County, while 73.8% of the actual class lived in Westchester. Additionally, 3.88% of the respondents live in the Bronx, while 8.4% of the actual class lived in the Bronx.

In certain instances, the total number of students responding to a question does not add up to the total number who returned the survey (206). This is due to the fact that some respondents failed to answer a question or responded to a question that was not applicable to their current status. In these cases, we have used the actual number of respondents.

#### **DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF ENTIRE CLASS OF 2009**


*Gender:* Almost three-fifths (58.5%) of the graduating class of 2009 are female, as shown in Table I. This represents a slight decrease from the previous year.

*Age:* Almost one-fifth (16.0%) of the 2009 graduates were under 22 years of age at the time of graduation which was lower than the Class of 2008 (23.1%), as shown in Table I. The percentage of students graduating between the ages of 22 and 29 increased from (48.1%) in 2008 to (52.7%) in 2009.

#### 2009 GRADUATES BY AGE




*Ethnic Background:* As shown in Table II, over half of the graduates are White (50.2%), 18.5% are Black, 20.7% are Hispanic, and 4.8% are Asian/Pacific. The percentage of graduates who are classified as Non-Resident Aliens is 4.0%.

#### **GRADUATES BY ETHNIC BACKGROUND – 2009**




**Degrees:** Over two-fifths of the graduates (41.1%) received an AAS degree. The AAS degree continues to be the top degree awarded. Almost one-quarter (29.7%) graduated with an AA degree, and one-sixth (16.7%) received an AS degree. The percentage of students receiving a certificate degree increased to 12.5% from 10.6%.

#### GRADUATES BY DEGREE: 2005-2009




#### **EMPLOYMENT PROFILE OF 2009 GRADUATES**

<u>Class of 2009</u>: Over three-fifths (64.6%) of the 2009 graduates who responded reported being employed, as shown in Table IV. Of those employed, 64.7% reported being employed full-time and 35.3% employed part-time.

*Location of employment:* Of the respondents who reported the location of their employment, half (55.6% or 74 graduates) reported working in Westchester County. Less than one-fifth (18.0% or 24 graduates) reported working in New York State, but outside Westchester County bringing the total percentage of those working in New York State to 73.6%. Another 3.0% reported working outside New York State. The work location of 23.3% of the respondents could not be determined.

*Salary:* The *mean salary (average)* for the 2009 graduates employed full-time was \$37,696. The median salary was \$27,000. Half of these graduates (50.7%) reported being either *very satisfied* (11.5%) or *somewhat satisfied* (39.2%) with their salary, as shown in Table V.

**Job Satisfaction:** More than four-fifths (80.4%) of the respondents also reported being either *very satisfied* (28.4%) or *somewhat satisfied* (52.0%) with their jobs, while 9.5% of the respondents reported being *somewhat dissatisfied* and another 10.1% reported being *very dissatisfied*, as shown in Table V below.

**Opportunity to Advance:** Almost four-fifths (76.1%) of the respondents felt either *very satisfied* (43.0%) or *somewhat satisfied* (33.1%) with their opportunities for advancement. This is slightly lower than last year's graduates, where more than three-fourths (79.6%) respondents expressed some degree of satisfaction.

*Westchester Community College's Impact on Employment:* Almost half (47.4%) of the respondents felt that *Finishing Their Degree* had been an important function in getting their current job. Of those who reported their employment status, 44.4% also felt that their *Specific Program of Study* was *important* to getting their current job.

A total of 59.4% of respondents reported that their current employment was to some degree related to their course of study. Almost two-fifths (39.4%) of the employed respondents indicated that their current occupation was *highly related* to their program of study at the college, and one-fifth (20.0%) indicated that it was *slightly related*.

While two-fifths 40.6% indicated that their current job was *not related* to their program of study at the college, almost three-fourths (72.7%) of the respondents felt that their Westchester Community College education prepared them for their current job either to a *great degree* (44.7%) or to a *slight degree* (28.0%).


<u>Class of 2009 Employment Status Compared to Previous Classes:</u> Considerable decrease is seen in the mean beginning salary of the employed graduates when comparing the 2009 graduating class with previous year. The mean beginning salary decreased from \$43,696 in 2008 to \$37,696 in 2009 as shown in Table VI.

The percentage of respondents working in Westchester County decreased to 55.6%.

LOCATION OF EMPLOYMENT: 2009



The Class of 2009 survey results show a higher percentage employed than the previous year. As shown in Table VII, 64.6% of the 2009 graduates reported being employed, compared to 61.1% in 2008. The percentage of those working full-time decreased from 72.2% in 2008 to 64.7% in 2009. The percentage still seeking employment increased from 14.6% in 2008 to 19.3% in 2009.

#### **EDUCATION PROFILE OF 2009 GRADUATES**

**<u>Class of 2009</u>**: Almost three-fifths of the respondents (58.3%) or 123 graduates reported attending a college, university, or training program, as shown in Table VIII. Of these students, 75.6% reported attending full-time.

*Demographic Characteristics of Those Attending College:* Of the 2009 graduates who reported continuing their education, 70.9% were female; 45.3% were White; 19.7% were Black, and 21.4% were Hispanic, as shown in Table IX.

**The College's Contribution to Achieving Transfer:** The 2009 graduates consider Westchester Community College to have been very effective in assisting them to transfer. Of those respondents who indicated *transferring* was a goal, more than three-fourths (95.3%) reported that the college was either *very effective* (77.9%) or *somewhat effective* (17.4%) in helping them to achieve their goal of transferring to a four-year institution.

When graduates were asked how well Westchester Community College prepared them for further study, almost three-fourths (73.1%) indicated that they felt *well prepared*, and another 22.5% felt *somewhat prepared*. Very few (4.4% or only seven graduates) reported feeling *unprepared*.

A large percentage reported being in a field of study either *highly related* (60.4%) or *slightly related* (27.3%) to their program of study at Westchester Community College. However, 12.2% reported being in a field of study *not related or applicable* to their program of study at the college.

*Four-Year College's Contribution to Affecting Transfer:* The 2009 respondents were asked to rate the most important factors affecting their decision to transfer to a four-year college. The three factors with the highest percentage of respondents rating them *very important* were: *Availability of Program* (80.5%), *Location and Cost* (75.4%), and *Reputation of College* (69.3%). The least important factor was *Recruitment by College* (25.6%), as shown in Table X.


*Future Educational Goals:* Over four-fifth (81.9%) of the respondents who are continuing their education expect to earn a bachelor's degree or post baccalaureate degree at the completion of their studies than those in the previous year (80.5%), as shown in Table XI.

<u>Class of 2009 Higher Education Status Compared to Previous Classes:</u> A comparison of the 2009 graduates to the four previous classes with regard to continuing their education shows that the percentage who are continuing their education (58.3%) has decreased from the previous year (61.6%). In addition, the percentage attending full-time increased slightly – 75.6% this year compared to 73.0% last year.

#### STUDENT EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC EXPERIENCES

**Overall Evaluation:** Survey respondents continue to give positive feedback in their overall evaluation of the college, the faculty, and the courses they took in their major, as shown in Table XII. Of the 2009 graduates (99.6%) gave a very satisfied or satisfied response to the Availability of Courses. A large percentage of the graduates (98.6%) also were satisfied or very satisfied with Overall Quality of Instruction, 98.0% were either satisfied or very satisfied with Courses in Major, and (96.1%) gave a very satisfied or satisfied response to Overall Westchester Community College Experience.

Table XIII further breaks down the evaluations for the Class of 2009 into the more specific responses of *very satisfied*, *somewhat satisfied*, *somewhat dissatisfied*, and *very dissatisfied*. Over three-fourths (76.0%) of the respondents gave a *very satisfied* response to their *Overall Experience with Courses in Major*. Three-fourths (75.6%) of the respondents also were *very satisfied* with the *Overall Westchester Community College Experience*.

**Degree of Preparation for Further Study:** Table XIV shows that of the respondents who evaluated the extent to which Westchester Community College had prepared them for further study, almost three-fourths (73.1%) felt that they were *well prepared*. Another one-fourth (22.5%) felt *somewhat prepared* and 4.4% felt they were *not at all prepared*.



Table XV is a breakdown of the results in descending order of the percentage of students who were *very satisfied*. Students who did not use a service were excluded in calculating percentages.

The evaluation by students of college services shows that the graduates were particularly positive about Library services. It received the highest percentage of *very satisfied* responses (71.4%). Computer Services (66.1%), Reading and Math Skills Facilities (65.5%), Advising by Academic Faculty (59.6%), Tutorial Services (58.1), Registration (52.3%), and Advising by Counseling Faculty (50.0%) also received high percentages of *very satisfied* responses.

Those services receiving the greatest percentage of *very dissatisfied* responses were Job/Career Services (9.8%), Transfer Services (7.6%), Health Services (7.4%), and Advising by Counseling Faculty (6.5%).

In terms of usage, the services reported being used by the most respondents were Registration (95.1%), Admissions Services (93.6%), Library Services (92.6%), and Computer Services (91.7%). The services reported used by the least number of respondents were Health Services (47.0%), Recreational and Athletic Facilities (54.5%), Job/Career Services (55.3%), and Financial Aid (59.8%).


#### **EFFECTIVENESS IN STUDENT GOAL ATTAINMENT**

Westchester Community College graduates were asked what best describes their most important reason for earning a college degree. Table XVI shows that more than one-half (50.5%) of the 2009 respondents selected *To Increase Their Chances of Job Placement or Advancement*. Over one-fourth (30.8%) chose *To Prepare to Transfer to a Four-Year College*, and almost one-fifth (18.7%) selected *To Reach Other Goals Such As Self-Fulfillment*.

The graduates were also asked to evaluate how effective Westchester Community College has been in helping them to reach goals in four areas: (1) Academic Goals, (2) Career Goals, (3) Personal Goals, and (4) Social/Cultural Goals. The following is a synopsis of the results in each area.

#### **Academic Goals**

*Goal of Increased Knowledge:* Table XVII shows that on each of the six questions exploring the success of the college in helping graduates to achieve their academic goals, over ninety percent indicated on each sub-goal that Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them.

**Transfer Goals:** Table XVIII shows that 77.9% felt that Westchester Community College had been very effective in helping them to Transfer to a Four-Year Institution.

The graduates also were asked how effective the college had been in helping them to achieve their goal of Meeting Professional or Graduate School Requirements. Of those who consider it a goal 64.8% felt Westchester Community College had been very effective in doing so, as shown in Table XVIII.

In terms of *very effective* responses, the highest marks were given to *Attaining a Degree Required for a Job* (64.8%), *Attaining Skills Useful on a Job* (64.4%), *Developing Idea of Career Goals* (60.8%), and *Improving Professional Status* (60.3%). The lowest was given to *Improving Chances of Making More Money* (56.5%).

### **Personal Goals**

*Personal Growth:* Table XX lists the personal growth objectives to which the respondents gave the highest percentages of *very effective* responses. The top three were *Developing an Interest in New Ideas* (71.2%), *Develop a Sense of Responsibility* (67.6%), and *Increase Desire and Ability to Learn* (66.1%). *Learn to Participate Effectively in a Community* (53.1%) received the lowest percentage of *very effective* responses.

#### Social and Cultural Goals

Of the graduates who included cultural and social enrichment as goals for attending Westchester Community College, *Appreciation of Art and Architecture* received the highest percentage of *very effective* ratings (46.6%) followed by *Involvement in Social Activities* (36.7%), *Appreciation of Theater* (31.5%), and *Appreciation of Musical Performance* (30.7%). Respondents felt that the college was least effective in supporting *Involvement in Political Activities* (22.8%) as shown in Table XXI.
