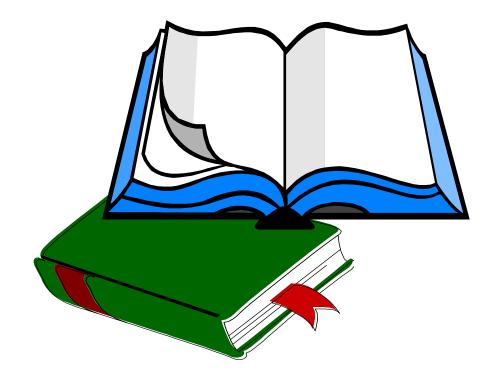

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#### WESTCHESTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE

#### **MISSION STATEMENT:**

The mission of the Westchester Community College is to provide and foster life-long learning for the residents of the County. Through credit and non-credit courses and programs leading to an Associate Degree or college certificate, the College provides (at convenient on-and off-campus locations) high-quality, affordable, comprehensive education to meet the career, transfer, vocational, remedial and recreational needs of the Westchester community. #### **ACHIEVEMENTS:**

- Westchester Community College ranks among the 30 community colleges in the SUNY system: sixth in total credit student enrollments, and first in non-credit enrollments. We had a Fall 2009 headcount of 14,147 students in credit classes, and 15,153 in non-credit courses.
- Diversity of the student body: Approximately 55% of the total credit student body is female, and 47% are minority.
   In the Fall of 2009, students enrolled at WCC were from 58 other countries.
- Westchester Community College has new and updated Transfer Agreements as of 2009-10 with the following: College of New Rochelle, Cornell University, Dominican College, Iona College, Mercy College, Morgan Statue University, and New York Institute of Technology.
- The percentage of 2008 graduates who reported transferring to other Colleges 61.5%.
- Of the 2008 graduates responding to the annual graduate survey, 61.1% of the respondents were employed either full-time (72.2%) or part-time (27.8%). Of those employed, 61.6% were employed in Westchester County and another 16.6% in New York State, but outside the County. They work for virtually all major corporations, small businesses, government, hospitals, etc. in the County.
- Average salary earned by first-time employees, full-time in a new job, six months after graduation from the College: approximately \$43,696. The median salary was \$34,000.
- Number of programs of study at the College: 40 Degree programs granting an Associate Degree, and 22 Certificate Programs.
- New programs that have been approved are: Digital Filmmaking (AS and Certificate), Computer Security &
  Forensics (AAS and Certificate), Marketing, (AS, in addition to existing AAS), Energy Systems (AAS) Human
  Services (AS). Programs that have been revised and updated are: Mechanical Technology (AAS), Electrical
  Technology (AAS), and Radiologic Technology (AAS).

- The Harold L. Drimmer Library is the focal point for the information and research needs of students, faculty, staff and administrators, and is open to the general Westchester County Community. The library's resources and services range from Media, to print and electronic books, subscription databases that include full-text newspaper and magazine articles to virtual reference services and online course materials. Due to our resource-sharing partnerships with SUNY and WALDO, we are able to provide extensive interlibrary loan services. Users can also search for resources in the Westchester County and the New York Public Library System.
- The Online Education program continues to grow with increasing numbers of students enrolled. At present, students
  can obtain a certificate in Computer Programming and a Liberal Arts Social Science and Liberal Arts Humanities
  associate's degree online. Every scheduled face to face class now has online component that enables faculty to
  access the web to enhance instruction and communication.
- The College's physical plant consists of 218 acres which includes 21 buildings, approximately 25 acres of parking
  lots and approximately 22.7 acres of athletic fields. All our public facilities are handicapped accessible, and we
  continually seek improvements through our capital projects planning and implementation.
- In addition to the lovely 218 acre campus, 30 off-campus sites offer courses to both credit and non-credit students.
   Since 1970, the College has offered classes in over 39 public schools from Yorktown to Yonkers, approximately 110 organizations in the For Profit, Not-for-Profit and Government Sectors, 53 civic associations from the American Red Cross to the Yorktown Chamber of Commerce, in over 18 public libraries from Armonk to Yonkers, in 4 penitentiaries, in 26 hospitals, and in 19 nursing homes. Accessibility is our watchword.
- The public uses the College facilities for more than just courses. Last year over 369,000 individuals used the facilities for meetings from the American Red Cross Association's "Lifeguard Training", the BOCES "Young Authors Conference" and the Association of Retarded Citizens Theater Program, to the Westchester/Putnam "ACTSO Kickoff,", to the NFTE Business Plan Competition, to the NYS Code Enforcement Training Program, to the Theodore Young Community Center Summer Day Camp, to the "Hate Crime Education Workshop" sponsored by the Asian Society, to AYSO Soccer, to the US Post Office "Passport Day," to the NYS Gang Investigators Association Conference," to seminars sponsored by the Rockland Economic Development Center, to the Westchester Library Association's Annual Conference, to meetings of the Westchester Municipal Officials Association, to environmental seminars sponsored by the Westchester Chemical Society, to the Tri-County Basketball Playoffs, to the "Baseball Umpires Conference," to the Westchester County Department of Health's many provider-training workshops, to meetings of the Westchester Photographic Society, to the annual conference for the "Westchester Rockland Dietetic Association," to meetings of the Women's Enterprise Development Center, to the Westchester County Association's Planning Conference, to the "NYS Math Association of Two-Year Colleges Conference," to the Hudson Valley Blood Services Fall/Spring/Summer Blood Drives, to the American Heart Association's "Basic CPR Training", to the NYS Media Arts Festival, to the White Plains Recreation Department's soccer practices and games, to meetings of the Westchester Putnam Chapter of the Retired Public Employees Association, to the National Alliance on Mental Illness of Westchester "In Our Own Voice: Living with Mental Illness Conference," to the American Women of African History Conference, to the Huaxia School, to the New York State Notary Public Exams, the "SCORE" Annual Board Meeting, the "Women's Leadership Conference," as a polling site for the Town of Greenburgh Elections, to hosting the Region XV Basketball Tournament, to the "American Society of Safety Engineers Conference." AARP's 2010 Statewide Livable Communities Video Conference and many others.
- The College provided 500 non-credit continuing education/community services courses in Spring 2009 excluding computer and ESL classes. Everything from Real Estate Licensing to Walking Tours of the Old Croton Aqueduct is offered.
- At the close of the fiscal year on August 31, 2009, the Westchester Community College Foundation raised a total of \$3.9 million in scholarships and general funds and another \$1.2 million for the Gateway Center Campaign. The Gateway Campaign has now exceeded its initial goal of raising \$14.5 million for the Gateway Campaign and raising more than \$9 million for capital construction costs.
- Westchester Community College Foundation ranks 1st among 30 SUNY Community Colleges and 7<sup>th</sup> among the 64 SUNY Colleges and Universities in fund raising.
- For the third consecutive year (2006-2007 through the 2008-2009 academic years), the Foundation awarded \$1 million in scholarships. We will achieve this goal again in the current fiscal year.

- The Foundation's Endowed Faculty Chair program has provided in excess of \$100,000 per year for faculty use. The
  purchase of equipment, attendance at conferences, and the sponsoring of lectures have been an invaluable
  component to the fabric of enhancing faculty development and providing the best experience for our students in the
  classroom. Currently, 37 Faculty Chairs have been endowed.
- The Foundation funds the Volunteer Center which has over 400 members who mentor and tutor students, assist in
  the Academic Support Center, and act as conversation partners with students in the English Language Institute. The
  Native Plant Center, which is a Foundation project, is dedicated to educating people about the importance of
  wildflowers and native plants of the Northeast and currently boasts a membership of 400 with a mailing list of 3,000.
- The Office of College Community Relations continued to expand the College's website and to conduct print, electronic media, advertising and public relations campaigns, as well as maintain the College's Speaker's bureau. A growing initiative in the Web area is increased visibility on Social Networking sites such as Facebook, Linked In, MySpace, etc.
- Community Services in conjunction with SUNY Youth Sports Institute, now offers over 300 youth coaches certification training.
- EOC received increased funding from the State University in the amount of \$4,773,581 to provide tuition-free developmental, academic and vocational training and comprehensive support to 650 underserved adults.
- EOC developed and is currently piloting a Pharmacy Technician Training Program in collaboration with CVS
  Pharmacy to prepare students for entry level career oriented positions in pharmacology. A mock pharmacy is in the
  process of being established on the school premises and a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony is scheduled for sometime in
  May, 2010. EOC's Pharmacy Tech students will be assigned to externships at CVS sites where job openings exist
  and they will be considered for employment opportunities at those sites upon the completion of training.
- A Tech Enhanced Classroom was established at the EOC providing the capability on on-line instruction, videoconferencing and more for students and staff. This facility has successfully been used for educational exchanges with students in different parts of the country, virtual college tours, professional staff development, and more.
- EOC is an official GED test site. Five hundred forty-five (545) community residents were tested on site and given an opportunity to obtain their high school equivalency diploma to date. Priority registration for testing was extended to students enrolled in GED programs at EOC and partnering agencies.
- Through EOC's College Connection's Initiative (CCI), college success workshops were incorporated into the program. The workshops were designed to help students prepare for and make their transition to college easier by sharing information, giving advice and providing coaching and mentoring support. CCI students participated in virtual college tours and will be taken on college campuses in the upcoming year. EOC coordinated efforts with two divisions on campus and several programs to facilitate the enrollment of EOC students and to arrange reverse referrals of college applicants who required academic preparation in order to pass the ability to benefit test for admission into college. Partnerships were established with the Yonkers Public School District's Pathways to Success Program and with Westchester County's Department of Social Services to promote the enrollment of successful GED completers into EOC's College Prep Program.
- EOC continued to provide the Job Readiness Training (JRT) Program in support of Westchester County Department
  of Social Services' effort to meet mandated work participation rates by engaging eligible recipients in work-related
  activities. Ninety-nine individuals received academic and/or vocational training in the allied health or business fields,
  as well as 60 hours of Career Readiness training, job search assistance and job placement services. EOC worked
  closely with the Westchester Human Resource Management Association to provide a Work Readiness Club which
  offered workshops and mock interviewing sessions for JRT participants.
- EOC continued to partner with Career Gear and Dress for Success, two New York City based organizations, to
  provide work appropriate clothing, networking events with professionals, mentoring services, and job retention
  support to targeted populations.

- EOC established affiliations with several employers and not-for-profit organizations including Empress Ambulance, Trans-Continental Credit and Collection Corp, Greyston Foundation and Westchester Community Opportunity Program to provide internships and/or clinical experiences for students, training referrals, and more. Several students were hired from internships into permanent jobs.
- EOC expanded support to students enrolled in the English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Program. Software was installed in the instructional technology lab (aka ATTAIN Lab) to aid students with oral pronunciation. Additionally, ESOL students were provided with job preparation and placement support, which was provided in past years to vocational students only. ESOL students were also provided with information about the 2010 census and encouraged to complete the census forms. Informational sessions were provided to students about filing taxes and about the availability of free tax preparation services.
- EOC collaborated with the City of Yonkers' Office of Workforce Investment to co-enroll EOC's vocational students, share job openings and to access employment information about vocational graduates. This collaboration is expected to enhance EOC's ability to document job placement and performance outcomes.
- Videoconferencing capability was built into EOC's General Education Development (GED) curriculum. Students
  studying to obtain their equivalency diploma actively participated in video conferences and educational exchanges
  with school districts nation-wide, NASA, the Smithsonian, and more. The videoconferences focused on a wide range
  of topics in the sciences, social studies, multiculturalism and literature. Student engagement and the pass rate on
  the GED test showed significant improvement as a result.
- EOC continued to host the computer camp for the County Youth Bureau's Westchester Scholars Program for young high achievers.
- The College is a leading partner in the County's Workforce Investment Act program. The College served approximately 201 WIA funded students last year. Additionally, we served 2 NEG and 10 OASA's students, the National Energy Grant and the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services respectively. In addition, WCC's Professional Development Center, through its contract training and its administration of the Academy for Entrepreneurial Excellence, worked with employees from approximately 16 companies.
- The College, through the Cisco Networking Academy, is offering not only the CCNA, but the next level certification CCNP (Cisco Certified Network Professional), both Cisco security certifications, Voice over IP training, and Cisco courses for A+ Certification and Server+ certification as well as the Panduit Certified Installer certification.
- The ELI served over 4,000 English learners in 2008-2009 including students enrolled at the Valhalla Campus and 2 out of 11 convenient extension locations around the County. Forty percent of ESL enrollments are at extension locations; ELI students hail from 106 Countries and speak 50 languages.
- Throughout the College's main campus and extension sites, 110 labs are available supporting all academic programs, which provides MAC's and Pentium-class PC's for student use. In the past year a new Human Services Laptop Lab was added and an expanded Pre-Algebra Lab.
- The College enrolled approximately 946 students in the sixth year of its ESL programs at the New Rochelle and White Plains Public Libraries.
- The Professional Development Center (PDC) was selected as one of the training providers for a Contextualized English Language grant. PDC developed and implemented contextualized curriculum for employees of three Westchester companies and developed curriculum for two other Hudson Valley community colleges who are also participating in this grant, Whole Foods was one of the participating employers. The Balance of Westchester/Putnam LWIB is the lead agency for this grant.
- Enrollment in the Mainstream Program for Older Adults' Collegium Program continues to be very strong approximately 175 members each semester. A second day was offered this fall, to provide an opportunity for additional older adults to participate. Further expansion is expected in the Fall when the program relocates to the Knollwood Center and will have an additional classroom.

- The Professional Development Center assisted in the design and implementation of a leadership academy for the Westchester County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation.
- Through the College's Professional Development Center, 284 sections of non-credit computer courses were, or are, being offered during the 2009-10 academic year both at the main campus and at four extension locations.
- The Ossining Extension Center continues to expand its summer youth Science Academy for ages 8-16.
- Community Services partners with over 40 restaurants to bring "A Taste of Westchester" to the community, with over 700 participants in 2009-2010.
- The ACE Advanced College Experience Program offered college classes in the high schools. 136 classes were offered in 2009-2010 at 32 different high schools, with over 1950 students enrolled.
- Project Transition is the Displaced Homemaker Retraining Center for Westchester and Putnam Counties. This program is funded by the NYS DOL Office of Workforce Investment and the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance. Project Transition serves residents who have been widowed, divorced or separated, who are single parents, or whose spouse has been disabled or permanently unemployed. Last year, we provided training to 180 students from Sept 1, 2008 August 31, 2009. Over the past 23 years that the project has been in existence, Project transition Staff have hired more that 8000 New York State displaced homemakers, and help them to enter or re-enter the workforce and become taxpaying citizens again.
- Community Services continued to partner with the Hauxia Chinese School to offer Chinese language and culture classes to American children of Chinese descent; over 650 children and adults were served in 2009-2010.
- The Westchester Community College Center for the Arts, White Plains, expanded its pre-college arts programs to include it first annual "Spring Break Art Camp for Kids"
- The Mount Vernon Center is the host location of the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Summer Entrepreneurship Academy, an extensive six week, high school aged program presented in partnership with the Network Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship and Mount Vernon Youth Bureau.
- The Center for Digital Arts at the Peekskill Extension Center continues its robust Digital Arts courses for 7 77 year
- The Center for Digital Arts at the Peekskill Extension Center was given a five year contract by the City of Peekskill
  Public schools to expand the after-school technology programs as part of the districts Learning Enrichment Activities
  Program (LEAP).
- Mainstream, The Institute for Mature Adults, is serving as the lead agency for the Northwest Region Livable Community Connection sponsored by the Westchester County Office of Senior Programs and Services.
- The College continues to work with The Westchester Business Council of Westchester to offer a joint program for small business owners called The Academy for Entrepreneurial Excellence. In addition together we have created a successor program entitled "Executive Level", designed for higher level leaders.
- The Information Technology department upgraded our mail gateway security application over the last year. Since the upgrade we continue to see a 20% drop in spam and phishing related e-mails to college staff.
- The Information Technology department continues to enhance its disaster recovery capabilities. Through the use of virtualization and storage area networks we now mirror 50 production servers to a secondary location on campus.
- The Information Technology department continues to incorporate the use of single sign-on into new and existing applications. This technology allows us to use a single user-ID and password for authentication into different systems. This gives students and staff a better experience when moving between different applications.

- Our PC Management system has been upgraded to use Microsoft's System Center Configuration Manager 2007.
  This will allow greater control of our desktop PC inventory as well as increased reliability of our systems for staff, faculty and students. Additionally, Novell networking components have been removed from our desktops allowing for greater speed and reliability.
- The Information Technology department installed an e-mail and file archival application. This application keeps a
  backup of all e-mails and files as they are created allowing us to restore files and email more efficiently, search email
  and files from a single application, and set aside files for litigation holds.
- The Information Technology Department continues to manage and improve the delivery of security patches to all
  desktop systems. At the present time, we are scanning for and deploying over 350 different patches to installed
  software packages.
- The college has added SMART technology to 29 classrooms bringing to 67 the total of SMART rooms on the Valhalla campus. Four other Valhalla classrooms were added to the existing 27 multimedia classrooms. Including mobile carts and classrooms at extension sites, the college now has 109 classrooms with enhanced instructional technology.
- The PeopleSoft Portal has been deployed for both faculty, staff and student access. In addition to other services
  available through the Portal, faculty and staff are able to update their contact information, enter time sheet inform
  ation and leave requests via PeopleSoft HR self-service. Students are also able to access PeopleSoft self-service
  functionality through the Student Portal.
- The Information Technology department continues to implement green technologies. Energy efficient blade servers are being installed, requiring less space, power, and cooling. Virtualization software has been upgraded, allowing more applications to run on the same hardware, and therefore, reducing the number of servers required.
- The Mount Vernon Center hosted 2 Café Academy for higher school students in partnership with the Mount Vernon Youth Bureau. The program was funded by a 21<sup>st</sup> Century Grant received by Youth Bureau.
- Westchester Community College has received national recognition from the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT), winning the 2009 Charles Kennedy Equity Award for promoting diversity and cultural awareness. This recognition comes after the college was recognized, earlier this year, with the Northeast Regional Equity Award from the ACCT. That regional award qualified the college to be considered on the national level. The ACCT national award is given to an ACCT member's governing board and chief executive officer for demonstrating leadership in setting policies and assuring results for the enhancement and expansion of opportunities for minorities and women in areas such as enrollment, completion, participation in higher mobility college majors, campus environment, employment, promotion and others.
- Fourteen faculty/professional staff members were recognized as SUNY Chancellor Award winners last year. The
  college continues to hold the record for having the most chancellor award winners than any other community college
  within the SUNY system.
- Members of the EMS Department attended a continuing education program sponsored by the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons (AAOS) and Jones and Bartlett Publishers. Both the Department Chair and Curriculum Chair as well as a number of department adjunct faculty successfully completed The Advanced Assessment and Treatment of Trauma course. In addition, all of the Department of Pre-hospital EMS attendees were awarded instructor and course coordinator status. This new Trauma course will enhance the courses offered by the department.
- Since the Office of Academic Assessment and Institutional Effectiveness was established in 2004 to address assessment mandates set by the State University of New York and Middle States Commission of Higher Education, 86 assessment reviews and 16 institutional effectiveness reports have been completed. Assessment reviews have encouraged the updating of syllabi to address the assessment of student learning outcomes, the use of rubrics and communication and discussion of goals and program issues with the department and division.

- In an effort to strengthen instruction in developmental and introductory college-level courses, Academic Affairs has
  promoted the creation of Learning Community modules on campus. The planning phase of the project will be
  completed by the end of Spring 2010, and the Academic Affairs team anticipates offering the first Learning
  Community modules in Spring 2011.
- The College's new PeopleSoft student systems software modules were implemented during the spring 2010 term with significant assistance from the College Registrar. The Admissions Office will successfully implement PeopleSoft during fall 2010. As part of transition to the new PeopleSoft system, the Admissions Office has been processing applications for several months. The College's new student portal (MyWCC) has been launched. The student services modules were the final step in a multi-year, college-wide PeopleSoft implementation process that provides the College with one integrated state-of-the-art system that serves its data organization and processing needs in Finance, Human Resources, Payroll and Student Services.
- Direct Lending was implemented by the Office of Financial Student Assistance, one year ahead of the new Federal legislative mandate.
- The Virginia Marx Children Center enhanced its website to facilitate enrollment by introducing an online application.
- The Center's license was renewed by the NY State Office of Children and Family Services and received its
  Certificate of Compliance by the State of NY Office of Fire Prevention and Control (OSHA). It also passed
  inspection by the Westchester County Health Department and was re-accredited by the National Association for the
  Education of Young Children.
- In April 2010, the Children Center proudly opened its new children's library. The library celebrates reading by providing a number of reading experiences ranging from a quiet reading/listening in a beautifully designed nook to interactive reading augmented by tapes and story props.
- The Virginia Marx Children Center's director was chosen as a recipient of the Child Care Council of Westchester's
  Joey Award for 2010. The Joey Awards are given to distinguished individuals and organizations for their outstanding
  contributions to children and families and the child care profession.
- TRIO/Student Support Services Programs, a federal grant program funded by the US Department of Education exceeded all goals regarding program enrollment, retention (85%), good academic standing (86%) and graduation/transfer (51% in 4 years) for the at-risk student population participating in the Program.
- The College received high honors for their work with students deemed to be academically at high risk. This work earned the regard of the College Board.
- The 2009-2010 fiscal year is the JobSTAR program's 20<sup>th</sup> year anniversary with Westchester Community College
  and Department of Social Services. This contract serves TANF/TANF eligible Westchester County residents who
  are unemployed or underemployed. In addition, JobStar serves the Department of Corrections by helping eligible
  inmates to earn a ServSAFE certification. Over its 20 year history, JobStar has served 6086 residents, helping
  nearly 1800 residents to be financially independent from welfare.
- The College's orientation program for new students was expanded by one day, from 2 to 3 to meet the surge in the
  first-time student enrollment and the increase interest in orientation among new students. Another orientation
  program was added in January, 2010 to meet the needs of students and their families who entered the college
  during the spring term.
- The Food For Thought Program was developed as a twice-a-month series that seeks to engage both our day and evening students in round-table luncheons. Members of the College faculty, staff, or administration, partnered with the Office of Student Affairs to serve as program hosts.
- In response to the H1N1 Flu Virus occurrences, a campus-wide, educational and safety campaign was developed to
  reduce the number of incidents at the college and to manage a possible outbreak. The plan was developed in
  accordance to the CDC Guidelines for Response to Influenza for Institutions of Higher Learning.

- The Professional Development Center partnered with The Guidance Center, New Rochelle, in a WIRED grant funded through the workplace to provide a blended learning experience for thirty at-risk older youth to develop skills and prepare for the Comp TIA A+ certification exams. Students participated in the PDC's online A+ training program offered with Gatlin Education and also had weekly hands-on lab sessions led by a College instructor.
- The PDC now also provides consulting services and this year developed training documentation for a leading insurance agency.
- The PDC ran a photovoltaic program in collaboration with Ulster Community College.
- Westchester Community College worked with three local utility companies (Entergy, Con Ed, and New York Power Authority) to develop an A.A. S. Energy Systems degree program which will prepare students to work in the energy field.
- Our Extension Center in Mahopac High School expanded its offerings to include lifelong learning courses for the community.
- The Extension Task Force continues to work on expanding services to off campus students, by expanding technology at all locations, conducting surveys and hosting the "Extension Center Celebration" on the main campus (April 2010).
- The Department of Community Services partnered with the American Home Inspection Training Institute and now trains over 100 students to become licensed home inspectors.
- The Department of Community Services partnered with World Instructor Training Schools to offer Personal Fitness training to over 75 students in 2009-10.
- Community Services offered "greening your home" courses for the community including an introduction to solar photovoltaic systems for homeowners and the homeowner's guide to the green home.
- Community Services offered courses to help our residents "survive the recession" and "survive a layoff".
- Community Services launched the Real Estate Property Management Certificate program and has trained over 75 students in this area.
- Community Services launched the Arborist certificate program for those interested in going into the tree care industry or moving up the career ladder in the field.
- Community Services launched the Fiber Optics training certificate program in partnership with BDI datalynk.
- The Ossining Extension Center offered the Mental Health Technician Program for the first time in the fall of 2009 with a class of 11 students. The program includes both classroom and externship components. 98% of the students passed the National Certification Exam.
- The Ossining Extension Center Surgical Technologists Program is now in its fourth year. Graduates have become
  employed in Westchester County hospital operating rooms and specialty clinics.
- The Ossining Extension Center Patient Care Technician series of courses, which includes Infection Control for Phlebotomy students. Our students have a 95% pass rate for the National Certification Exams that correspond with each course.

- The non-credit Integrated Patient Care Technician Pilot-Program (PCT) was initiated in spring 2010 at the Ossining Extension Center. This program was funded by a Workforce Innovation in Regional Economic Development (WIRED) grant from the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment Training Administration, working in partnership with the Connecticut Department of Labor and Employment and The Workplace, Inc. For the first time, PCT students completed a hospital-based externship. As a grant-partner, Phelps Memorial Hospital served as the externship site for this student cohort.
- The Ossining Extension Center hosted its first semi-annual Health Career Fair in fall 2009 with over 55 attendees.
  The Health Career fair featured credit and non credit program information and employers from Westchester County
  hospitals as well as the American Red Cross. The Center will host its second semi-annual Health Career Fair in
  spring 2010.
- Awarded the Westchester Library System's 2010 National Library Week Recognition Award for outstanding contributions to libraries and literacy.

#### **NEW INITIATIVES FOR 2010/2011**

- The Westchester Community College Foundation will continue its fundraising activities in the community throughout the year.
- The Online Education Program will be building on its initial success and will continue expanding its offerings for the 2010-2011 academic year.
- EOC will provide a Computer Literacy Program for low income youth during the summer and will expand
  programming throughout the academic year to provide Microsoft Certification training to a greater number of
  community residents.
- EOC will establish a GED hotline to provide information to the public on commonly asked questions about GED testing.
- EOC will expand collaborations with employers to provide internship and clinical sites for students enrolled in business and health programs.
- EOC will explore and develop new vocational training programs that offer certification, as resources allow, focusing
  on green initiatives, allied health and business. Certification of EOC's Medical Coding and Billing Program will be
  pursued.
- EOC will continue to seek out new initiatives and provide expanded support to the ESOL population to help them succeed in acquiring English language skills, developing vocational competencies, and enrolling in college.
- EOC will expand its marketing campaign to create greater visibility in the community. The goal of this effort is to
  encourage a greater number of low income community residents to take advantage of the free training that is
  available in the current economy.
- In Partnership with the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship, and the Mount Vernon Youth Bureau, Mount Vernon Extension Center will continue to offer a 6 week intensive Summer Entrepreneurship Academy for Mount Vernon Youth.
- The English Language Institute (ELI) continues a collaboration with the Jacob Burns Film Center which began in summer 2008, building ELI students English skills through "Digital Storytelling".
- The College will continue to develop its academic assessment endeavors in General Education and the Program Review of individual curricula using the SUNY Academic Assessment Initiative guidelines.
- The College Start Summer Academy will expand to run on the Valhalla campus in Spring 2010 as part of the College's strategic plan to improve student retention and 1<sup>st</sup> year experience.
- The Center for Digital Arts at the Peekskill Extension Center will increase its direct marketing to local immigrant families to invite them to participate in the non-credit programs for adults and youths.
- The Westchester Community College Center for the Arts in White Plains will continue to support local school districts with "Artist in Residence" programs and faculty development training.
- College Information Technology is continuing the process of expanding its wireless network for student laptop use throughout the campus, and at extension centers.
- The Information Technology Department is working on a plan to relocate the second datacenter to a larger room in the Classroom Building. The new facility will allow for greater security, increased cooling, and the space required to provide additional disaster recovery and backup capabilities.
- The Information Technology department installed and is currently deploying new security hardware that will monitor the network and check for security vulnerabilities.

- In addition to over 200 student PCs being replaced this summer as part of the College's 5 year technology replacement plan, 372 additional PCs/iMACs will be installed, increasing the total number of PCs/IMACs/laptops supported by IT to over 3000, including those in 6 remote locations.
- In the next year, the college plans to upgrade eighteen more rooms with SMART technology while adding an additional nine classrooms with enhanced instructional technology.
- Several years ago, SUNY embarked on a project to replace its legacy Institutional Research data systems. We are
  in the process of building the interfaces to PeopleSoft required to meet the fall 2010 deadline.
- The Information Technology department will continue to install green technologies in the Datacenter to help lower the cost of cooling and requiring less power.
- The Information Technology department will continue to look for ways to strengthen network security.
- The College is engaged in preparing its five-year Periodic Review Report for the Middles States Commission on Higher Education. The report will be submitted in June 2010.
- To provide the necessary support for students during their first year at the College, a First Year Experience Steering Committee was created and appointed to research and explore consultation options. During the academic year 2010-2011, this project will focus on providing an action plan for creating a First Year Experience program through studying the campus resources and needs.
- The Advanced College Experience (ACE) Program expects to add at least six more high schools and several hundred more students.
- In collaboration with the Yonkers Public Schools, the college received an SED Grant to continue the Collegiate Academy Program at Roosevelt High School.
- A new model for academic advising is being developed. It engages students at the time they become prospects and continues to support them until they graduate, transfer or complete a certificate.
- The Ossining Extension Center continues to offer individual state certification training courses that are in high
  demand and prepare professionals for various roles in childcare, education and healthcare such as the Infection
  Control Seminars, Child Abuse Prevention Seminars, CPR workshops, School Violence Prevention and Intervention
  Workshops, and Spanish for Healthcare Professionals courses.
- The Gateway Center at Westchester Community College will open in the summer of 2010. This 70,000 square foot multipurpose building will provide critically needed classrooms and interdisciplinary academic space. Departments in the Gateway Center include the Modern Language department and English Language Institute; the academic business faculty and the Professional Development Center. Four new centers will serve the student body and the community The Welcome Center, The Institute for Entrepreneurial Studies, a Citizenship Integration Center and the Community College Consortium for Immigrant Education.
- The College is working to transfer the STEP (Science, Technology, and Engineering Program) program for minority high school students to WCC.
- Working with JP Morgan Chase to create a Center for Financial and Economic Education.
- Community Services will be offering the General Appraisal pre-licensing program for those interested in becoming commercial real estate appraisers.
- Community Services will partner with the American Home Inspection Training Institute to offer a Locksmith certificate program to our community.
- Community Services will partner with World Instructor Training Schools to provide Personal Fitness training for specialized populations.

- Community Services will partner with the Native Plant Center to offer a certificate in Sustainable Landscape Gardening.
- The College/Division of Continuing Education partnered with Tidewater Community College and 20 other community colleges in a Health Information Technology grant proposal. Tidewater Community College, as the lead agency, was awarded one of 5- \$17 million grants to implement Health Information Technology in an approximately-10-state region. This grant will enable Westchester Community College to train 180 people annually in HIT; the training is scheduled to begin in the summer/fall 2010.
- As Part of the PeopleSoft 2<sup>nd</sup> phase implementation project, the College is exploring the best Budget preparation solution that is available to integrate with the Financials, HR and Payroll modules.

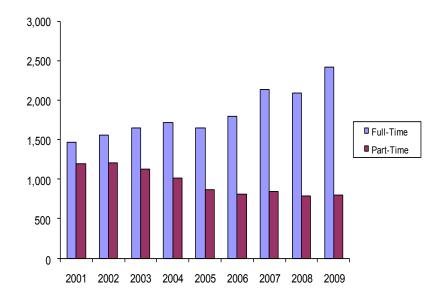

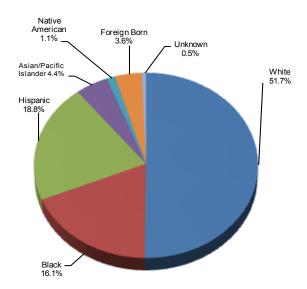

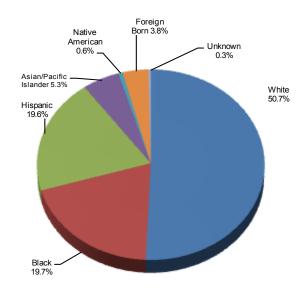

### 2009 Graduates by Ethnicity



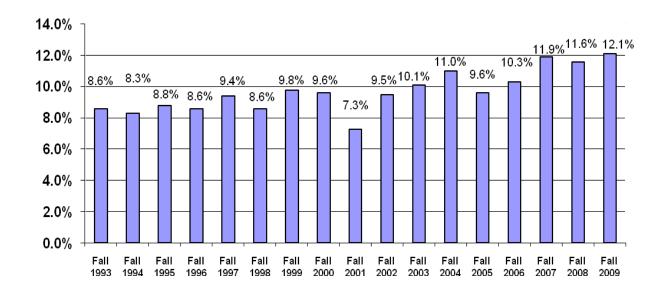
### 2010 Graduates by Ethnicity
