

ACHIEVEMENTS FOR 2010-2011

- Westchester Community College ranks among the 30 community colleges in the SUNY system: sixth in total credit student enrollments, and first in non-credit enrollments. We had a Fall, 2010 headcount of 13,893 in credit classes, and 13,654 in non-credit courses.
- Diversity of the student body: Approximately 54% of the total credit student body is female, and 56% are minority and Hispanic. In the Fall of 2009, students enrolled at WCC were from 58 other countries.
- Westchester Community College has new and updated Transfer Agreements as of 2009-10 with the following: College of New Rochelle, Cornell University, Dominican College, Iona College, Mercy College, Morgan State University, New York Institute of Technology, Houghton College, Lehman College (CUNY), Mount St. Mary College, and SUNY Empire.
- Of the 2009 graduates responding to the annual graduate survey, 64.6% of the respondents were employed either full-time (64.7%) or part time (35.3%). Of those employed, 55.6% were employed in Westchester County and another 18.0% in New York State, but outside the County. They work for virtually all major corporations, small businesses, government, hospitals, etc. in the County.
- The average full time salary earned by first-time employees in a new job, six months after graduation from the College is approximately \$37,696. The median salary is \$27,000.
- Number of programs of study at the College: 45 Degree programs granting an Associate Degree and 22 Certificate Programs.
- The public uses the College facilities for more than just educational courses. Last year over 369,000 individuals used the facilities for meetings including the American Red

Cross Association's "Lifeguard Training", the BOCES "Young Authors Conference", the Association of Retarded Citizens Theater Program, the Westchester/Putnam "ACTSO Kickoff", the NFTE Business Plan Competition, the NYS Code Enforcement Training Program, the Theodore Young Community Center Summer Day Camp, the "Hate Crime Education Workshop" sponsored by the Asian Society, AYSO Soccer, to the US Post Office "Passport Day", the NYS Gang Investigators Association Conference", seminars sponsored by the Rockland Economic Development Center, the Westchester Library Association's Annual Conference, meetings of the Westchester Municipal Officials Association, environmental seminars sponsored by the Westchester Chemical Society. to the Tri-County Basketball Playoffs, the "Baseball Umpires Conference", the Westchester County Department of Health's many provider-training workshops, meetings of the Westchester Photographic Society, the annual conference for the "Westchester Rockland Dietetic Association", meetings of the Women's Enterprise Development Center, the Westchester County Association's Planning Conference, the "NYS Math Association of Two-Year Colleges Conference", the Hudson Valley Blood Services Fall/Spring/Summer Blood Drives, the American Heart Association's "Basic CPR Training", the NYS Media Arts Festival, the White Plains Recreation Department's soccer practices and games, meetings of the Westchester Putnam Chapter of the Retired Public Employees Association, the National Alliance on Mental Illness of Westchester "In Our Own Voice: Living with Mental Illness Conference", the American Women of African History Conference, the Huaxia School, the New York State Notary Public Exams, the "SCORE" Annual Board Meeting, the "Women's Leadership Conference", as a polling site for the Town of Greenburgh Elections, hosting the Region XV Basketball Tournament, the "American Society of Safety Engineers Conference", AARP's 2010 Statewide Livable Communities Video Conference and many others.

- The Harold L. Drimmer Library is the focal point for the information and research needs of students, faculty, staff and administrators, and is open to the general Westchester County community. The library's resources and services range from media, to print and electronic books, subscription databases that include full-text newspaper and magazine articles to virtual reference services and online course materials. Due to our resource-sharing partnerships with SUNY and WALDO, we are able to provide extensive interlibrary loan services. Users can also search for resources in the Westchester County and the New York Public Library System.
- Since its founding in 1969, Westchester Community College Foundation has raised funds to meet student needs. The Foundation's primary objective is to provide support for incoming, continuing, and graduating students through scholarships.
- The Foundation experienced a successful year, despite the continued challenges presented by the economy. Due to the opening of the Gateway Center and other circumstances, the Foundation's annual Spring for Scholarships gala was replaced in the 2009-2010 fiscal year with a scholarship fundraising drive in honor of Shirley Phillips, former Director of the Foundation. This effort received a strong response, with over \$400,000 raised for a scholarship fund in Shirley's name. While distressed markets significantly affected our endowment, many donors of established permanent funds made extra contributions to ensure continued funding of scholarships and

- programs. This enabled the Foundation to continue to distribute over \$1 million in scholarship grants this year, since UMIFA regulations prevented endowment spending from "underwater" accounts.
- The annual appeal, the Foundation's largest source of unrestricted funding, surpassed its goal by raising over \$450,000 in FY 2009-2010. This was largely attributable to the creation of the new President's Council, a group of distinguished individuals who have demonstrated their commitment to the College and the Foundation with significant annual support.
- The College has added multimedia technology to multiple classrooms on the Valhalla campus. Mobile carts and multimedia classrooms are available at extension sites. The College now has 125 classrooms with enhanced instructional technology.
- New Programs that have been approved (2010-2011): Fashion Production and Technology, AAS and Veterinary Technology, AAS. Programs pending approval: Journalism, AS; Network Security & Forensics, AS. The College also participated in the SUNY-wide initiative to improve our students' transfer experience within the SUNY system.
- In response to the campus-wide interest in improving the First Year Experience of students, the College is participating in a consultation project, Foundations of Excellence (FoE), through the John Gardner Institute to evaluate the policies, practices, services, and initiatives pertaining to first-year students. The FoE is a guided self-study and improvement process to promote student learning and success in the first year and includes conducting surveys of faculty/staff and students, analyzing the collected data, benchmarking with peer institutions, and reporting the results in writing. A final comprehensive report with various action items will be submitted at the end of the Spring 2011 semester.
- In 2011 the College was honored by the White Plains Library Foundation for its outstanding work to boost literacy and opportunity for new immigrants in the County.
- As of Spring, 2011, over \$16 million in PELL grants have been disbursed, a 9.5% increase compared to the same general time last year (\$1,389,701). The number of recipients increased by 7.5% for the same period. Almost \$8 million in loans have been disbursed, an increase of 13%.
- The Virginia Marx Children's Center was a participant in the field test for New York State's quality control and improvement initiative to ensure that young children have the opportunity for high quality early learning experiences entitled, QUALITYstarsNY. This emerging State accreditation and rating scale is expected to be implemented in the next 18 months. Our successful involvement in this program is likely to result in a 5 star rating (the highest one can achieve in this program) and State accreditation. The Virginia Marx Children's Center is already fully licensed by the New York State Office of Families and Children Services and nationally accredited by the National Academy for Early Childhood Programs.
- The Virginia Marx Children's Center collaborated with the Child Care Council of Westchester on a number of significant projects that included hosting the JPMorgan Chase and the Child Care Council of Westchester, Inc., Business Leaders Breakfast, and presenting two workshops on early childhood literacy.

- JobSTAR assisted 254 TANF men and women to overcome economic hardship. This year it is offering the WEEKEND ACADEMY, a program that provides academic enrichment programming for youth who are between the ages of 6 and 14 and whose parents are enrolled in one of JobSTAR's adult programs. Adult offerings include Academic Preparation both for college and the high school equivalency exam, Computer Skills training and Culinary Arts and Sanitation Certification. In addition, JobSTAR works with the Department of Corrections offering an Academic Workshop for incarcerated youths.
- The Disabilities Services Office is working with Access (formerly VESID) and other social service agencies to serve the 1,386 students with learning and/or physically disabilities. Student retention for those receiving special accommodations, from fall semester to spring semester, or those students already registered for summer and/or fall, was 87%. A review of the transcripts of students in June, 2010 revealed the following: 69% of these students had a GPA of 2.0 or better and 50% had a GPA of 2.5 or better. Approximately 117 students with disabilities graduated during 2009-2010. Their completion rate in developmental courses was 56%.
- The Disabilities Services Office developed a new, comprehensive, career development focus funded by the Perkins grant. The emphasis is on career exploration, the development of educational goals, communication skills, self-advocacy, study and presentations skills, resume writing and job interviewing techniques. Later this term, our disabilities specialist will accompany students with disabilities when they have a job or internship interview to ease the student's transition from college to work and make positive connections in the community. A network of employers and community members who are willing to support our students with internships and employment has been initiated.
- The Career Services Office developed a partnership with the Westchester Human Resources Management Association to remain current on employer needs and to enhance career services.
- The Health Office worked closely with community organizations to provide health
 education and wellness programs. Monthly HIV and STD Testing were provided in
 partnership with the Westchester Department of Health and Planned Parenthood. Two
 flu vaccination clinics were held in the fall. The Health Office worked with over 30 county
 agencies to sponsor Alcohol and Substance Abuse Awareness Day which was well
 attended.
- The federally funded TRIO program assisted 165 students who were academically and financially disadvantaged. TRIO exceeded all annual goals; student persisted at a rate of 88%, 90% of the students are in good academic standing and 45% graduated/transferred within 3 years.
- Westchester Community College hosted the Region's 15 Division 3 Men's and Women's Basketball Championships. Nearly 3,000 residents attended over a 3 day period. Both the Men and Women's Basketball teams made it to the semi-final round of the Region's 15 Championship. A Women's Soccer Team was added. The Women's Bowling team is ranked 4th in the country. Both the Volleyball Team and Men's Soccer Team made it to the Regional playoffs.

- In addition to the lovely 218 acre campus, 30 off-campus sites offer courses to both credit and non-credit students. Since 1970, the College has offered classes in over 39 public schools from Yorktown to Yonkers, approximately 110 organizations in the For Profit, Not-for-Profit and Government Sectors, 53 civic associations from the American Red Cross to the Yorktown Chamber of Commerce, in over 18 public libraries from Armonk to Yonkers, in 4 penitentiaries, in 26 hospitals, and in 19 nursing homes. Accessibility is our watchword.
- The English Language Institute (ELI) served nearly 4,000 English learners in 2010-2011, forty percent taking classes at 12 convenient extension locations around the County. ELI students hail from 106 countries and speak 50 languages.
- The English Language Institute continued and expanded their 8 year relationship with the Westchester County Public Library system to offer ESL classes to members of the White Plains, New Rochelle and Ossining communities.
- In 2010, the ELI celebrated the 20th year of its Intensive English Program, which has served an estimated 375 students per year for a total of over 7,500 students out of a total of 50,000 ELI students during that period.
- The ELI continues to partner with Community Based Organizations (CBOs) to expand access to quality English language instruction to members of the immigrant community throughout Westchester County.
- A certification program in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL), now in its fourth semester, has received regional recognition for its high quality and innovative design. The course is an intensive hands-on learning experience for those who will pursue employment in the field of TESL/TEFL in adult or college programs in the USA or abroad.
- Putting to use new technology made possible by the new Gateway Center, the ELI has
 made an effort to bridge the technology gap among recent immigrants by incorporating
 texts with online access and support in all ESL programs in Valhalla. Faculty members
 have been trained in best practices for incorporating technology into their classrooms.
- Enrollment in the Collegium program continues to be very strong approximately 195
 members each semester. This program offers intellectually challenging classes and
 opportunities for socialization to older adults.
- The Professional Development Center assisted in the design and implementation of a leadership academy for the Westchester County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation.
- Through the College's Professional Development Center, 273 sections of non-credit computer courses were offered during the 2010-11 academic year both at the main campus and at three extension locations.
- As part of a partnership with Microsoft in their 'MyPC" program, non-credit programs offered through the Professional Development Center were expanded including new courses in Windows 7.
- Project Transition, the Displaced Homemaker Retraining Center of Westchester and Putnam Counties, is funded by the NYS Department of Labor DOL Offices of Workforce Investment and Temporary and Disability Assistance to serve NYS residents who are widowed, divorced or separated, who are single parents, or whose spouse is disabled or

- unemployed. The training consists of intensive computer skills training and career strategies training that include skills assessment, career decision counseling, work readiness coaching, confidence building, as well as job search services
- Community Services in conjunction with SUNY Youth Sports Institute, offered certification training to over 400 youth coaches.
- Community Services partnered with over 40 restaurants to bring "A Taste of Westchester" to the community, with over 700 participants in 2010-2011.
- Community Services continued to partner with the Huaxia Chinese School to offer Chinese language and culture classes to American children of Chinese descent; over 750 children and adults were served in 2010-2011.
- A partnership between the Native Plant Center and Community Services has created and promoted a successful new certificate program, Sustainable Gardening with Northeast Flora, and has enrolled over 100 students in the programs in 2010-2011.
- Community Services began offering series 6, 65 and 7 test preparation programs, to provide preparation for those interested in careers in the financial services industry.
- Community Services has expanded the Personal Fitness Training Certificate Program to include certificates targeting fitness for specific populations, including children and older adults. In 2010-2011, over 90 students were trained.
- Community Services partnered with the American Home Inspection Training Institute and has trained over 125 students to become licensed home inspectors.
- Community Services offered "greening your home" courses for the community, including an introduction to solar photovoltaic systems for homeowners, and the homeowner's guide to the green home.
- The College has partnered with The Successful Learning Center to offer classes for developmentally disabled adults.
- The College continues to partner with Westchester Community Opportunity Program, Inc. (WestCop), a private not-for profit, social service agency to offer credit-bearing Human Service courses to their early childhood education employees.
- The College now offers classes for college credit in 10 off-campus locations to better serve students and be more accessible. Classes are offered on a variety of schedules, and run day, evenings and weekends. Classes can be taken on a Fast Track accelerated schedule, in the early morning before going to work, and during accelerated Wintersessions and Maymesters.
- The Extension Task Force continues to work on expanding services to off campus students, by expanding access to technology at the school-based locations, and regularly conducts student surveys to ascertain needed growth areas.
- The Center for the Arts recently began offering general education classes to support art students studying at the County Center.
- Wintersession 2011 attracted 225 students, who earned 3 credits in just three weeks during their winter break, marking this is the second year of this successful program.
- New for summer 2011, Maymester is an accelerated program which offers students the opportunity to earn 3 credits in two weeks.

- The Advanced College Experience (ACE) Program offered college classes in the high schools. Over 160 classes were offered in 2010-2011 at 39 different high schools, with over 2000 students enrolled.
- The Ossining Extension Center continues to expand its summer youth Science Academy for ages 8 to 17 by including a new "Go Green" class designed to raise awareness about energy.
- The Ossining Extension Center continues to offer the successful Surgical Technology Program, in partnership with area hospitals. Graduates have gained employment in Westchester County area hospital operating rooms and specialty clinics.
- The Ossining Extension Center began offering a new Mental Health Care Technician Program. The program includes both classroom and externship components. Of the Fall, 2010 class, 98% of the students passed the National Certification Exam.
- The Center for the Digital Arts, Peekskill Extension expanded its non-credit Quick Start digital arts professional series to a 24hour-training package and created a Community Arts series.
- The Center for the Digital Arts, Peekskill Extension continued a new re-branding campaign in collaboration with digital art students who designed an artwork showcase ad and website redesign.
- The Center for the Digital Arts, Peekskill Extension added two additional smart instructional technology classrooms, bringing the Center to (7) smart classrooms that support General Education.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center experienced growth in total student hours tutored by 44% when comparing Spring 2010 to Spring 2011.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center successfully ran the College Start Academy (summer college preparatory program) in both Mount Vernon and Valhalla.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center in collaboration with Valhalla ASC, prepared reports and documentation necessary to receive renewal of the College Reading and Learning Association Tutor Certification. This is an international tutor program certification that certifies the College, who in turn certifies the tutors by setting a standard of skills and training for tutors. The College received renewal acceptance in November 2010.
- The Center for the Arts offered special events and sampler art classes and a series of free lectures, to encourage Westchester residents to explore the visual arts.
- The Center for the Arts expanded its youth programs and provided opportunities for over 300 young people in its creative summer series at an affordable price.
- As part of its community outreach program the Center for the Arts organized several exhibitions of its student's artworks. The most recent exhibitions have taken place at the beautifully renovated and expanded Greenburgh Public Library and St. John's Riverside Hospital.
- The Center for the Arts organized an "Empty Bowls" event, in collaboration with a national Empty Bowls Charity. All proceeds are to be donated to the Westchester Food Bank.

- The Division of Continuing Education is partnering with Tidewater Community College
 and 21 other community colleges in a Health Information Technology (HIT) grant.
 Tidewater Community College, as the lead agency, was awarded one of five \$17 million
 grants to implement health information technology in an approximately 10 state region.
 This grant is enabling Westchester Community College to train approximately180 people
 annually in health information technology.
- The Gateway Center opened in September 2010 and received Gold LEED Certification in January 2011.
- The Gateway Center hosted a community based organization forum with nonprofit
 organizations in attendance to discuss partnerships around the areas of financial
 education, leadership training and staff development, citizenship education, and The
 Gateway Center as the Center for co-sponsored events. Discussions regarding
 partnerships are underway with Westchester Hispanic Coalition, United Way of
 Westchester and Putnam, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Neighbor's Link, Center for Aging in
 Place Services (CAPS), and Westchester Arts Council.
- The new Welcome Center launched the Welcome Desk Volunteer Program, recruiting volunteers to work at the front desk for coverage of approximately 35 hours per week; hiring and training a Welcome Center Office Assistant; creating a floor plan publication of The Gateway Center in conjunction with the Publications Office. The Welcome Center staff called each newly admitted student to welcome them to the College and guide them through the remaining steps of the application process. More than 400 students have been called to date; 500 students have been called to remind them about Spring open house; and coordinated mailing to 5,000+ students for Academic Affairs.
- The Community College Consortium for Immigrant Education (CCCIE) redesigned its
 website (<u>www.cccie.org</u>) to include promising practices and resources and serve as a
 mechanism for expanded outreach and communication with the community college
 sector and relevant community and government organizations.
- The Institute for Entrepreneurial Studies coordinated the first Westchester Community
 College celebration of Global Entrepreneurship Week 2010, "Experience
 Entrepreneurship". Activities were conducted in partnership with the Business
 Department, the Entrepreneurship & Networking Club, the Professional Development
 Center and the English Language Institute to introduce entrepreneurship to students,
 faculty and staff.
- The Institute for Entrepreneurial Studies has initiated new programs: a social entrepreneurship program: Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE), the world's largest international social entrepreneurship program for colleges and universities; The Business Simulator, a practical, hands-on program that provides greater student benefits through the practical operation of a virtual business; ESL/Entrepreneurship course, a contextualized ESL course is being developed that will combine small business development curriculum with English as a Second Language;
 WestchesterEntrepreneur.com, an online resource hub that connects business owners with services and resources, in a collaborative role for the sharing of ideas in a noncompetitive environment.

- The Gateway Center celebrated Women's History Month by hosting a forum "Our History is Our Strength: Immigrant Women Share Their Stories."
- The Gateway Center will be the host of the Westchester Green Business Challenge, a
 joint program of Westchester County Government and the Business Council of
 Westchester to educate and encourage Westchester County businesses to reduce
 greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) while improving operational performance and saving
 money.
- EOC received funding from the State University in the amount of \$4,529,038 to provide tuition-free developmental, academic and vocational training and comprehensive support services to 618 underserved adults.
- EOC is an official GED test site. Four hundred fifty-five community residents were tested onsite and given an opportunity to obtain their high school equivalency diploma to date. Priority registration for testing was extended to students enrolled in GED programs at EOC and partnering agencies.
- EOC continued to provide the Job Readiness Training (JRT) Program in support of Westchester County Department of Social Services' effort to meet mandated work participation rates by engaging eligible recipients in work-related activities. Eighty-four individuals received academic and/or vocational training in the allied health or business fields, as well as 60 hours of Career Readiness training, job search assistance and job placement services.
- EOC continued to partner with Career Gear and Dress for Success, two New York City based organizations, to provide work appropriate clothing, networking events with professionals, mentoring services, and job retention support to targeted populations.
- Students studying to obtain their equivalency diploma actively participated in video conferences and educational exchanges with school districts nation-wide, NASA, the Smithsonian, and more at the EOC. The videoconferences focused on a wide range of topics in the sciences, social studies, multiculturalism and literature. Student engagement and the pass rate on the GED test continued to improve as a result.
- EOC continued to host the computer camp for the County Youth Bureau's Westchester Scholars Program for young high achievers.
- EOC offered a Pharmacy Technician Training Program in partnership with CVS
 Pharmacies to prepare students for entry level career oriented pharmacy positions. The
 program offered classroom instruction and experiential training; the latter of which was
 provided in a mock CVS pharmacy at the EOC and at externship sites in CVS
 pharmacies in Westchester and New York City. CVS hired the majority of students who
 successfully completed the first program and have committed to considering future grads
 for hire.
- EOC expanded the use of videoconferencing with GED students to broaden their horizons and exposure to other parts of the world and to provide opportunities for educational exchanges with students throughout the country.
- One hundred percent of the EOC's students who were enrolled in the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) class in the first semester passed the New York State exam.
 The students earned the highest test scores on record; five students achieved 99% or 100% on the state examination. The lowest score was 90%.

- Through EOC's College Connection's Initiative (CCI), low income students who were interested in attending college were provided with the information they needed to make informed decisions about college. In addition, they received academic preparation in the Center's College Prep Academy, participated in college visits and tours, and were provided with assistance to complete the college admissions and financial aid processes. College success workshops were incorporated into the CCI Program to prepare students for college enrollment and to make their transition to college easier.
- EOC continued to expand services for students enrolled in the English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Program. Collaborative learning partnerships for ESOL students were established through the Center for Interactive Learning, utilizing EOC's Technology Enhanced Classroom. These partnerships enabled students to participate in interactive programs sponsored by the Smithsonian.
- EOC offered digital literacy, Microsoft Certification and computer aided instruction to more than 217 students and community residents through its Advanced Technology Training and Information Networking (ATTAIN) Lab.
- EOC partnered with the Yonkers Employment Center, Westhab and Greyston
 Foundation in an effort to provide coordinated employment and training services to
 shared clientele. The collaborations had a positive impact on student retention and
 success and on the Center's ability to capture and document outcomes.
- A Direct Care Support Professional Training Program was launched at the EOC to prepare students for entry level positions as Direct Care workers to provide guidance and support to developmentally disabled and other vulnerable populations who require assistance meeting their daily needs.
- Tax Preparation services were offered on site at the EOC in partnership with Westchester County's Office of Workforce Investment and Westchester Community Opportunity Program. Tax returns were e-filed for 360 community residents to date.
- Two editions of ECHOES, a student magazine, were published by the EOC. The publications focused on the themes of *Generosity and Altruism* and *Gratitude*.
- With the support of the SUNY University Center of Academic and Workforce
 Development and a grant from Citigroup, EOC offered Financial Literacy classes to low
 income students and community residents.
- The College's physical plant consists of 218 acres which includes 21 buildings, approximately 25 acres of parking lots and approximately 22.7 acres of athletic fields.
 All our public facilities are handicapped accessible, and we continually seek improvements through our capital projects planning and implementation.
- The Student Center expansion will commence May 2011 and is expected to be completed December 2011. The new facility design will supplement existing activity and enhance student life.
- Information Technology continues to enhance its disaster recovery capabilities. Through the use of virtualization and storage area networks, we now mirror 80 production servers to a secondary location on campus.
- The data connection of the College's Extension sites to the main campus was upgraded over the past year, providing a significant performance increase.

- Information Technology began upgrading the College's Wireless infrastructure over the
 past year. A backup management device was installed to provide redundancy, and all
 newer wireless access points can now be managed from a single device. Fifty percent of
 the older access points have been upgraded.
- The College's PeopleSoft hardware infrastructure was upgraded over the past year. The
 new hardware is faster and requires less power and cooling. The new hardware also
 allows the College to upgrade our PeopleSoft environment to provide better service to
 our users.
- Information Technology provided PeopleSoft 9.0 Campus Solutions maintenance and support. Design and developed enhancements, customizations and numerous reports for various departments including Admissions, Student Records, Institutional Research, Student Financials and Business Office.
- Information Technology implemented PeopleSoft's HR Self-Services Time Reporting for salaried employees. Salary employees can submit leave requests through the PeopleSoft Portal or the PeopleSoft HRMS System.
- Information Technology implemented the Faculty and Student Center PeopleSoft portals. Faculty Center allows faculty to see class rosters, contact their students and enter grades on and off campus. The Student Center allows students to look at their schedules, grades, transcripts and register online.
- Information Technology designed and developed SUNY State reporting interface for PeopleSoft to fulfill mandated SUNY reporting requirements.
- Technical Services continues to manage and improve the delivery of security patches and updates to all desktop systems. Currently, we are deploying over 400 updates.
- Information Technology implemented Camtasia Relay lecture capture software. This
 software captures faculty lectures and stores them on a Web site so that students can
 review the lectures outside the classroom. Camtasia Relay provides closed-captioning
 and easy editing of the captions to improve compliance with the requirements of the
 Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

NEW INITIATIVES FOR 2011-2012:

- The Online Education Program will be building on its initial success and will continue expanding its offerings for the 2011-2012 academic year. Two new summer online sessions were added this year.
- The College has created a new organizational unit, called the "Office of School-College Collaboration", to facilitate programmatic articulation between the College and high schools in the region, and to ease the transitions for students enrolling at Westchester Community College from those high schools.
- The Business and Modern Language Departments moved to the new Gateway Building in September 2010. Courses are now offered in modern technology assisted classrooms including a trend setting Garment Construction Lab for the Fashion Curriculum and a new "Focus Room" for the Marketing Curriculum.
- The Division of Continuing Education is exploring partnerships with Hilltop Hanover Farm Environmental Center and Cornell Extension to offer programs on sustainable farming and other "green" programs.
- Community Services will be partnering with academic departments to provide Photovoltaic Installation education for those interested in this green technology career path.
- In Partnership with the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship and the Mount Vernon Youth Bureau, Mount Vernon Extension Center will continue to offer a 6 week intensive Summer Entrepreneurship Academy for Mount Vernon Youth.
- The English Language Institute (ELI) continues a collaboration with the Jacob Burns Film Center which began in summer 2008, building ELI students' English skills through "Digital Storytelling". To expand the use of digital storytelling to more classes, the current emphasis is moving to train-the-trainer.
- The English Language Institute is expanding both educational and professional opportunities for members of the immigrant community by creating career pathways for students by offering contextualized ESL courses in healthcare, entrepreneurship and customer service.
- By expanding computer support for students and faculty, the ELI is creating additional uses for Gateway Center ELI computer labs, including a Self-Access Language Lab for computer-aided language learning, know as CALL.
- The College will continue to expand its innovative scheduling of credit classes to better serve adult students who work or have other obligations: Friday nights and Sundays at the Ossining Center, a 7 week accelerated courses at Yonkers/Cross County and at Ossining, and an Early Risers Program at Cross County. The Ossining Center offers a 3 week Wintersession, which is expanding to Cross County. We anticipate expanding the Maymester program, a two week intensive summer program being piloted in May 2011.
- Our extension center in Blessed Sacrament High School in New Rochelle will expand its current schedule and offer Friday evening classes, beginning in Fall 2011.
- The Center for the Digital Arts, Peekskill Extension will increase its direct marketing to local immigrant families to invite them to participate in non-credit programs for adults and youths.

- The Center for the Digital Arts, Peekskill Extension will present a new sequence of web classes for fall 2011 developed in partnership with Web Curriculum Committee for the Art Department.
- The Center for the Digital Arts, Peekskill Extension will launch a new series of 3D
 Animation credit and non-credit courses beginning summer 2011 with the introduction of the Maya (Autodesk) software.
- The Center for the Arts in White Plains will continue to support local school districts with "Artist in Residence" programs and faculty development training.
- The College is working to transfer STEP (Science, Technology, and Engineering Program) for minority high school students to WCC.
- The Division of Continuing Education will assume administration and oversight of the current Inter-Village Continuing Education program, which serves Ardsley, Dobbs Ferry, Irvington, and Hastings; the program has been run in the past by the four associated Boards of Education.
- The Advanced College Experience (ACE) Program expects to expand to additional schools offering additional sections, to offer more high school students the opportunity to earn early college credits.
- In collaboration with the Yonkers Public Schools, the college received an SED Grant to continue the Collegiate Academy Program at Roosevelt High School
- The Ossining Extension Center will celebrate its 10 Year Anniversary with a series of events including a recognition ceremony to be held in fall 2011.
- The Ossining Extension Center will offer a new non-credit healthcare certificate to train Central Sterile Technicians.
- The Ossining Extension Center will expand its non-credit CEU offerings for funeral directors.
- The College is working with JP Morgan Chase to create a Center for Financial and Economic Education.
- The Gateway Center Monthly Film Series will enhance students' educational experience by featuring outstanding films representing many countries. Many of these films will tell the story of people who find themselves in a new country or culture, whether they are immigrants, tourists or staying temporarily, either for employment or education. Other films may deal with the issues of assimilation into the new culture or coping with everyday life.
- EOC will expand its capacity to provide Microsoft Certifications in the Advanced Technology Training and Information Networking (ATTAIN) Lab. In addition to offering Microsoft Word, Excel and Power Point Certifications, EOC will provide Microsoft Technology Associate Certification training in IT Pro, Developer and Database.
- EOC will implement a GED Assessment Project (GAP) to pre-test applicants for the General Education Examination to ensure that they are prepared to take and pass the GED test (for an equivalency diploma). Community residents who desire to take the GED test will be required to take an Official Practice Test (OPT) to determine their skill levels before they are allowed to register to take the GED exam. The overall goal is to increase the percentage of students who take and pass the test statewide.

- EOC will increase its capacity to provide on-line testing and registration services in order to serve applicants and students more efficiently.
- EOC will establish a GED hotline to provide information to the public on commonly asked questions about GED testing.
- EOC will expand collaborations with employers to provide internship and clinical sites for students enrolled in business and health programs.
- EOC will continue to seek out new initiatives and provide expanded support to the ESOL population to help them succeed in acquiring English language skills, developing vocational competencies, and enrolling in college.
- EOC will expand its marketing campaign to create greater visibility in the community. The goal of this effort is to encourage a greater number of low income community residents to take advantage of the free training that is available in the current economy.
- Over 300 student PCs will be replaced this summer as part of the 5 year technology replacement plan.
- Information Technology is upgrading all College PCs to the Windows 7 Operating System. This upgrade will provide greater reliability and security to our desktop systems.
- Information Technology is replacing our Helpdesk and Inventory system to provide more reliability and flexibility. This update will include Web and email reporting of requests as well as better management of hardware and software.
- Information Technology will upgrade the PeopleSoft 9.0 Enterprise Portal to version 9.1 to provide better service to our users.




