

ACHIEVEMENTS FOR 2011-2012

- Westchester Community College ranks among the 30 community colleges in the SUNY system: Sixth in total credit student enrollments, and first in non-credit enrollments. We had a Fall 2011 headcount of 13,969 in credit classes, and 14,106 annual in non-credit courses.
- The College's physical plant consists of 218 acres which includes 21 buildings, approximately 25 acres of parking lots and approximately 22.7 acres of athletic fields. All our public facilities are handicapped accessible, and we continually seek improvements through our capital projects planning and implementation.
- In addition to the Valhalla campus the College has 30 off-campus sites offering courses to both credit and non-credit students. Since 1970, the College has offered classes in over 39 public schools from Yorktown to Yonkers, approximately 110 organizations in the For Profit, Not-for-Profit and Government Sectors, and 53 civic associations from the American Red Cross to the Yorktown Chamber of Commerce, in over 18 public libraries from Armonk to Yonkers, 26 hospitals, and 19 nursing homes. Accessibility is our watchword.
- Diversity of the student body: Approximately 53% of the total credit student body is female, and 52% are minority and Hispanic. In Fall 2010, students enrolled at WCC were from 83 other countries.
- Westchester Community College has new and updated Transfer Agreements as of 2009-10 with the following: College of New Rochelle, Cornell University, Dominican College, Iona

College, Mercy College, Morgan State University, New York Institute of Technology, Houghton College, Lehman College (CUNY), Mount St. Mary College, and SUNY Empire.

- Of the 2010 graduates responding to the annual graduate survey, 61.6% of the respondents were employed either full-time (62.9%) or part time (37.1%). Of those employed, 60.2% were employed in Westchester County and another 24.2% in New York State, but outside the County. They work for virtually all major corporations, small businesses, government, hospitals, etc. in the County.
- The average full time salary earned by first-time employees in a new job, six months after graduation from the College is approximately \$35,826. The median salary is \$25,000.
- Number of programs of study at the College: 44 Degree programs granting an Associate Degree and 22 Certificate Programs.
- The public uses the College facilities for more than just educational courses. Last year over 405,000 individuals used the facilities for meetings including the American Red Cross Association's "Lifeguard Training", the BOCES "Young Authors Conference", the Association of Retarded Citizens Theater Program, the Westchester/Putnam "ACTSO Kickoff', the NFTE Business Plan Competition, the NYS Code Enforcement Training Program, AYSO Soccer, seminars sponsored by the Rockland Economic Development Center, the Westchester Library Association's Annual Conference, environmental seminars sponsored by the Westchester Chemical Society, the Westchester County Department of Health's many provider-training workshops, meetings of the Westchester Photographic Society, the annual conference for the "Westchester Rockland Dietetic Association", meetings of the Women's Enterprise Development Center, the Westchester County Association's Planning Conference, the "NYS Math Association of Two-Year Colleges Conference", the Hudson Valley Blood Services Fall/Spring/Summer Blood Drives, the American Heart Association's "Basic CPR Training", the NYS Media Arts Festival, the White Plains Recreation Department's soccer practices and games, meetings of the Westchester Putnam Chapter of the Retired Public Employees Association, the American Women of African History Conference, the Huaxia School, the "SCORE" Annual Board Meeting, the "Women's Leadership Conference", as a polling site for the Town of Greenburgh Elections," AARP's 2012 Statewide Livable Communities Video Conference", the Black Male Initiative "Brothers Moving Forward" Conference; 1st Annual Westchester Community College Student Film Festival; the American Society of Mechanical Engineers "Forum on Economic Development" Conference; the GIS Day-GIS Professionals in Industry, Government and Academia Conference "New Developments in IT Technology", the Westchester Regional Conference on "The Establishment of a Tobacco Free College Campus", WCC Chapters of Mu Alpha Theta and Omega "Spring 2012 Math and Computer Science Conference", Congresswoman Lowey's Conference "Innovation Roundtable & Business Innovation", Westchester Community College Division of Mathematics, Computer, Engineering, Physical Sciences & Technologies "Mass Transit Conference: Tracks to Your Future Conference" and many others.

- Harold L. Drimmer Library is the focal point for the information and research needs of students, faculty, staff and administrators, and is open to the general Westchester County community. The library's resources and services range from media, to print and electronic books, subscription databases that include full-text newspaper and magazine articles to virtual reference services and online course materials. Due to our resource-sharing partnerships with SUNY and WALDO, we are able to provide extensive interlibrary loan services. Users can also search for resources in the Westchester County and the New York Public Library System.
- Faculty in the Computer Security and Forensics program established a boot camp program for students to prepare for the Microsoft Technology Associate (MTA) certification exam. MTA certification is a critical first step to employment in the area of cyber security.
- Faculty participated in a grant funded (by Con Ed) initiative to infuse sustainability throughout different curricula including Fashion Technology and Global Business in the Business Department. The final presentations led to a second round of funding for the initiative.
- Our faculty from many departments participated in outreach activities across the County. The participation included judging at the Tri-County Science Fair at White Plains High School, hosting tables at Engineering Expo and at our Open Houses, welcoming high school students at the annual Math and Computer Science on-campus "Mathfest."
- In response to the campus-wide interest in improving the First Year Experience of students, the College continues participation in a consultation project, Foundations of Excellence (FoE), through the John Gardner Institute to evaluate the policies, practices, services, and initiatives pertaining to first-year students.
- The Foundation received the prestigious Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) Circle of Excellence Award for educational fundraising. The award recognizes overall performance and overall improvement in educational fundraising programs based on data submitted to the Council for Aid to Education's (CAE) Voluntary Support of Education survey.
- Since its founding in 1969, the Westchester Community College Foundation has raised funds to meet student needs. The Foundation primary objective is to provide support for incoming, continuing and graduating students through scholarships.
- Marking Dr. Joseph N. Hankins 40th Anniversary as President of Westchester Community College, the Foundation established the Dr. Joseph N. Hankin Gateway to the Future Scholarship Fund. In a gala celebration honoring the anniversary, more than \$1 million was raised for the Fund.
- The Foundation secured funding of \$1.5 million for the establishment of a Single Stop Program on the campus for three years. Single Stop USA is a national not-for-profit organization that bridges the information gap separating low-income families from lifechanging public benefits, tax credits, and other essential services that remain untapped and inaccessible. The goal of the program is to increase retention rates at the College by alleviating the outside pressures that deter students from completing their education.

- The Division of Student Affairs is committed to providing services and programs that promote the college's mission and academic goals. The Division has assisted students in developing educational plans that align with their interests, goals and abilities while empowering them to take an active role in their education and assume personal responsibility and accountability.
- The Counseling Department completed a New Holistic Divisional Assessment Plan and developed a new transfer workshop to better prepare international transfer students in completing their education.
- The Counseling Department provided accommodations and related services to over 1000 students with disabilities.
- The Counseling Department developed and presented "Transition from High School to College workshop" as an outreach to prospective WCC students and their families.
- The Counseling Department provided Specialized Counseling and Accommodations to blind, deaf, hard of hearing and students on the Autism spectrum to maximize their potential.
- The Office of Admissions collaborated with the Welcome Center where calls are being made to new students to review enrollment process and encourage earlier enrollment.
- The Office of Admissions hosted information sessions throughout the year for prospective students to learn about the admissions process and the College in general.
- The Admissions Office partnered with the Office of Financial Student Assistance to have a representative touch upon the Financial Aid process so perspective students have a better understanding of what is availability.
- The Office of Admissions expanded Outreach Efforts to community based organizations, veteran agencies and added high schools to their target list on data collected.
- The Westchester Events Board (WEB) were the 2011 recipients of the Excellence in Programming Award presented to the Westchester Events Board (WEB) the student run programming board at the College. The award is presented by the National Association of Campus Activities and recognizes a College in the Northeast region of the US for having the most outstanding programming board structure and student events.
- The Student Government Association (SGA) was the recipient of the 2012 Diversity Challenge Award by the SUNY Student Assembly. SUNY Student Assembly is a body comprised of the collected Student Governments of all 64 SUNY campuses across the state. The award recognizes our institution for embracing and celebrating our campus diversity in unique and meaningful ways.
- Transfer Office continues to work with 4 year institutions on refreshing and creating articulation agreements; instant admits (on-site admission);weekly live chat through MEEBO; workshop series for both day and evening students; Transfer Day (120 colleges participated); Spring Transfer event with 80 schools participating; Vassar Summer program 3 WCC students were admitted for this summer;
- AoS (Accent on Students those with less than a 2.0 cumulative gpa) continue individual intensive intrusive counseling: Interim Grade Reports at 8 weeks, 10 and 12 weeks; 1st AoS scholarship (2 scholarships awarded to 2 students who improved their academic record);

- Counseling and Student Development introduced 1st and 2nd generation of student advisement template which will serve as the key assessment tool for Middle States. This also entailed the development of a separate drive for Counselors.
- Westchester Community College was one of thirty schools from the surrounding metropolitan area who participated and shared best practices/biggest problems/success stories in a Roundtable discussion regarding at-risk students.
- JobSTAR successfully helped 29 students who completed their assigned programs in obtaining permanent employment.
- JobSTAR designed and implemented the programs described in a contract with the Department of Social Services (DSS) offering a total of 12 program sections that served a total of 195 customers. The contract required a minimum of 152 total customers. A revamping of the Integrated Application for Today's Environment Program (formally the Computer Skill Enhancement program) was approved for Voc Ed status with the State of New York.
- In Spring, 2012 the English Language Institute expanded its relationship with the Westchester Library System with a new ESL program at a fourth library: the West Harrison Public Library. Enrollments in the College's ESL programs at New Rochelle and White Plains public libraries increased in Spring, 2012 to the highest level in the last 2 years.
- The English Language Institute (ELI) has expanded its partnerships with Community Based Organizations (CBOs) by offering morning ESL classes at the Westchester Community Opportunity Program (WESTCOP) in Tarrytown. Through this new partnership the ELI is serving over 150 additional county residents annually who have traditionally lacked access to high quality, affordable ESL instruction. These partnerships, including our ESL program at public libraries are providing English language training to about 1,500[d2] learners in Mount Kisco, Mamaroneck, Tarrytown, White Plains, New Rochelle, West Harrison and, soon, in Port Chester.
- The College's ELI has a successful new contextualized ESL course, ESL for Healthcare, which is an academic bridge program created to provide a career pathway for ESL students interested in further studies in the healthcare field. Over 60 students have participated.
- The ELI, in partnership with the Professional Development Center, contracted in 2011-12 with a local biotech firm to deliver contextualized, workplace ESL training for research engineers.
- The Center for the Digital Arts continues to expand its summer youth pre-college program by offering full-day 3D Animation and Game Design, and Multimedia Storytelling for Teens.
- The Center for the Digital Arts expanded its daytime general education offerings and continues to promote student artwork in its robust Creating Art in the Digital Age marketing plan, including a newsletter which is distributed to 47,000 people per year.
- Partnering with Entergy, Con Ed, and NYPA, the Technology Division, in partnership with the Professional Development Center, now offers an energy systems degree program.
- The Professional Development Center received approximately \$50,000 from SUNY to provide workforce development training to Westchester businesses in the biotech and food

and beverage sectors. In addition, PDC will be providing workforce development training for businesses in the advanced manufacturing and green sectors with funding from our One Stop Employment Center.

- New non-credit computer courses offered by the Professional Development Center include Essential Computer Skills 1 & 2; Introduction to Android Programming; MS Office Advanced Integration Techniques; AutoCAD for Landscape Design; Internet Selling; Windows for the Advanced User. In addition a program of individual tutoring sessions, "MS Office One on One", was introduced for students.
- The Professional Development Center and Project Transition collaborated on a course funded by a Perkins grant to provide training to displaced homemakers to prepare them to sit for the Microsoft certification exams in MS Word and MS Excel.
- Mainstream received funding from the Westchester County Department of Senior Programs and Services to increase the locations and number of exercise/fitness classes for seniors. Classes are offered at 14 senior apartment buildings and senior centers. Summer semester classes were added, and classes are now offered throughout the year
- Mainstream continues to serve as the lead agency for the Northwest Region Livable Community Connection sponsored by the Westchester County Department of Senior Programs and Services.
- Mainstream continues to offer Operation Talent Bank (funded by the Women's Research and Education Fund) and QuickBooks (funded by the Carl D. Perkins Vocational Training Act) skills training and job search strategies programs for unemployed older adults.
- Small Business Training for Mature Adults, a Mainstream course designed for older adults who want to learn more about starting their own businesses was offered in spring 2012 and will be offered annually.
- Community Services has successfully partnered with Hilltop Hanover Farms to offer a noncredit certificate program in Sustainable Vegetable.
- Community Services has partnered with the academic divisions to offer a non-credit Photovoltaic Installation program to prepare students to take the state exam for certification.
- Community Services, in partnership with Academic Affairs, offered the first Careers in Green and Sustainable Technology Info session which highlighted both credit and non-credit green and sustainable programs.
- The Yonkers Extension Center at Cross County Shopping Center continues its partnership with Westchester Family Services, RSVP of Westchester and AARP in offering the Work Search program which serves mature job seekers in Westchester County.
- Yonkers Extension Center at Cross County Shopping Center added multi-media and Smart instructional technologies to all ten classrooms.
- The Gateway Center continues to solidify its presence in the community by creating new partners and deepening existing ones. During the academic year 2011/12, the Gateway Center partnered with organizations such as White Plains School District, the United Way of Westchester and Putnam, Family Services of Westchester, Westchester Hispanic Coalition, Center for Aging in Place, JCY-Westchester Community Partners, and El Centro Hispano.

- The Gateway Center launched the Hispanic Heritage Month Committee to organize various campus-wide events to celebrate Hispanic culture. In 2011 the committee hosted a week-long celebration that attracted over 100 students, faculty and community members to activities around film, music and the arts.
- The Center for Financial and Economic Education (CFEE), launched in May 2011, is a new component of the Gateway Center dedicated to offering an array of financial education programs for the campus and for residents of Westchester County. With a goal of promoting economic advancement for our community, the CFEE has delivered personal finance workshops for over 1,200 students, faculty, alumni, and members of the public in its first year. Special workshops have been implemented for ESL students and for at-risk students in government-funded programs such as TRIO and EOP.
- The CFEE was instrumental in forming the Westchester Financial Education Alliance, a coalition of organizations in Westchester, including the United Way, Financial Planning Association of the Greater Hudson Valley and GreenPath Debt Solutions, dedicated to making personal finance education more accessible to the community through events like Financial Education Day.
- In collaboration with local partners, the Institute for Entrepreneurial Studies developed a series of four workshops entitled "Small Business Success".
- The Welcome Center offered various workshops and programs designed for the immigrant population re-credentialing workshops for foreign trained professionals in the areas of Education and Engineering/I.T., college information sessions geared specifically to the immigrant community, and 'Living in the U.S.', a workshop of practical and cultural information
- The Welcome Center launched the Student Portal Registration Helpdesk, expanded the role of the College's Call Center, began answering the main line of the College during lunchtime and evening hours, and contacted over 2,000 newly admitted students to welcome them to the College and review next steps in the enrollment process.
- The Division of Continuing Education is working in partnership with the Admissions Department, the EOC, and the Westchester Library System to offer college information sessions for clients of the County Department of Probation. The goal of this program is to assist Probation Department clients to transition into college.
- The Ossining Extension Center began the new Veterinary Technology degree program in Fall 2011.
- The Ossining Extension Center offered an Integrated Patient Care Technician Program, via a clinical partnership with Northern Westchester Hospital.
- The Ossining Extension Center worked in partnership with the Labor Department Healthcare employment counselor to assist students with resume building and job searching.
- The Extension Task Force continues to explore innovative ways of including off campus students in on campus activities through technology.
- In an effort to enhance customer service and the efficiency in which applicants were processed for enrollment, the Educational Opportunity Center (EOC) established a Welcome

Center and equipped it with a Smart Board and computers, creating the capacity for EOC to provide PowerPoint Presentations and to test and assess applicants online.

- The EOC implemented the Banner Student Records Management System to process student applications and manage institutional data related to student registration and enrollment, attendance, grading and more. Faculty, administrators and staff received training on the effective and efficient use of the Banner system throughout the year
- As an official GED test site, the Educational Opportunity Center tested more than five hundred sixty three (563) community residents to help them obtain their high school equivalency diploma and prepare for higher education and/or employment.
- Working closely with the Admissions Office and Testing Center on campus, EOC assisted WCC applicants who did not a have a high school diploma to take the GED test to obtain an equivalency diploma in order that they might qualify for tuition aid.
- Students studying to obtain their equivalency diploma at the EOC actively participated in webinars, video conferences, and educational exchanges with school districts nation-wide, NASA, the Smithsonian, and new partner organizations including the St. Louie Higher Education Consortium and the World War II Museum in New Orleans. The video conferences focused on a wide range of topics in the sciences, social studies, multiculturalism and literature. Student engagement and the pass rate on the GED test continue to improve as a result.
- Through EOC's College Connection's Initiative (CCI), low income students who were interested in attending college were provided with the information they needed to make informed decisions about college enrollment. In addition, they received academic preparation in the Center's College Prep Academy, participated in virtual and "live" college visits and tours, and workshops on such topics as goal-setting, note-taking, time management and study skills. They were also given assistance in applying to college and for financial aid.
- EOC doubled its training capacity to prepare students for employment as Direct Support Professionals to care for and assist developmentally disabled individuals and other vulnerable populations with their daily needs. The class offered training in client specific programming, community integration and recreational activities. In addition, it provided training and certification for AMAP (Approved Medication Administration Personnel), SCIP (Strategies for Crisis Intervention and Prevention) and CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation).
- EOC continued to expand services to English language learners by offering additional training options, including English for the Workplace and English for Business and Health Careers. In addition to developing general English language skills, these programs focused on the acquisition of employment related language and provided students with the skills needed to enter into and succeed in the workplace.
- In an effort to increase the employability and earning potential of students who successfully completed the Certified Nurse Aide/Home Health Aide Program, the EOC developed and piloted two new courses, EKG and Phlebotomy, to prepare the students for employment as Patient Care Technicians. Graduates of this expanded program will go on to take the Certified Patient Care Technician exam offered by the National Healthcareer Association.

- EOC launched the Contemporary Office Administration Program to prepare community residents for employment as Administrative Support Specialists, Word Processors, Receptionists and Data Entry Clerks.
- EOC established a partnership with Landauer Metropolitan to provide internship and employment opportunities for Medical Coding and Billing students. The company hired ten students from our program thus far.
- The Student Center expansion is currently under construction and is expected to be completed in January 2013. The new facility design will supplement existing activity and enhance student life.
- Information Technology Department upgraded the College's Firewall and Router, which allows us to better control Internet traffic. The new firewall has allowed us to consolidate four separate security devices into a single device as well as reduced power and cooling needs in the Data Center. Reducing overall costs and increase efficiency.
- Information Technology Department upgraded the Colleges Storage Area Network (SAN) for improved performance and protection of the College's data. Better performance with our virtual and physical server environment which uses SAN has been achieved. All data on the primary SAN is replicated to a secondary location for Disaster Recovery.
- The Information Technology department took over the responsibility of the College's telephone system this past year. The Voice Mail system was upgraded and the system now supports unified messaging and has disaster recovery capabilities.
- Information Technology, in cooperation with Media Services and Instructional Technology, added new SMART rooms on the Valhalla campus.
- Information Technology is completing the replacement of their IT Helpdesk and Asset Management system. The new software, Microsoft Service Manager, will provide many new features, including web and email reporting of requests and automatic reporting of software licensing.
- Information Technology created a Financial Aid Status Page. The new process provides students easy on-line access to their aid status and eliminated numerous calls to the Financial Aid and Bursars Office.
- Information Technology developed an automated process with generates the data required for the IPEDS Human Resources, Student Financial Aid, Finance, and Graduation Rate survey components. In the past it took weeks to compile the required data. Now it can be done in a day.
- Information Technology developed processes to compile the data required to meet the Federal Governments Gainful Employment requirements.
- Information Technology developed a streamlined admission process for the Continue Education department. Continue Education students can complete the admission process, enroll in classes and pay their bill online.

NEW INITIATIVES FOR 2012-2013:

- The ELI will expand computer and technology support for English Language learners by creating additional resources for students to learn independently. Additionally, the ELI will provide faculty workshops on best practices in Computer Assisted Language Learning.
- A new ESL program will start at the Port Chester Public Library in summer 2012. This downtown location will significantly improve access to English language training classes in this key ESL location.
- The ELI is developing a University Preparation program as part of a plan to join the SUNY Global Center initiative for recruiting international students. We hope to expand our role as a point of entry for foreign students needing English training in preparation for college/university study.
- The Center for the Digital Arts Gallery will be partnering with the Hudson Valley Center for Contemporary Art on next year's Peekskill Project, a local arts exhibition.
- The Center for the Digital Arts will be transferring its Music Technologies lab to the Music Department and expanding its general education offerings in Peekskill.
- In fall 2012, Mainstream will begin a new initiative designed for adults 50 and older to enter college for the first time or reenter after a break from prior studies. On-campus and distance learning options will enable students to complete their Associate degree.
- The Gateway Center will continue to host films representing various cultures and countries. The Film line-up for the fall includes In America, La Americana, and Fireflies in the Garden.
- The Gateway Center is partnering with the English Department, the Art Department, ELI and others to host a series of events to celebration Hispanic Heritage Month, including an art exhibit of the artist Pedro Ospina, writer Willy Perdomo, movie and panel discussions of La Americana as well as other events.
- The Gateway Center will build an email database and periodically email updates about relevant workshops and initiatives to local businesses and other related groups.
- The Gateway Center will host workshops and an entrepreneurship course for both students and the community starting in the summer 2012.
- The Gateway Center will develop and offer situation-based role playing workshops that allows immigrant entrepreneurs to practice their English skills and gain practical experience
- The Gateway Center will partner with the Mount Vernon Youth Bureau and the Mount Vernon Extension Center to offer the Entrepreneurship Summer Academy to students high school students.

- The Center for Financial and Economic Education (CFEE) will continue to target personal finance training for ESL students by initiating a new series of workshops to teach the fundamentals of budgeting, saving, and managing credit and debt.
- The CFEE will expand offerings to the community at large by offering personal finance workshops and by repeating Financial Education Day, a half-day workshop open to the public, in 2013.
- The Welcome Center will expand initiatives in support of enrollment activities at the College.
- The Welcome Center will develop new programming in response to the expressed needs of immigrant-serving CBOs
- The Welcome Center will explore the possibility of expanding the citizenship program to additional sites/schedules
- Community Services will offer continuing education professional development hours to licensed architects and engineers, allowing them to maintain licensure.
- Community Services will expand Go Native University in partnership with the Native Plant Center, to offer additional Continuing Education credits for Landscape Architects.
- Community Services will expand its successful Green and Sustainable Living program.
- The Ossining Extension Center will continue to expand its summer Youth Science Academy for ages 8 to 17 by including two classes on animal health and care, to increase awareness of the Veterinary Tech profession.
- The Ossining Extension Center has enhanced the Central Sterile Tech program to align with the accreditation requirements of the International Association of Healthcare Central Service Materiel Management (IAHCSMM).
- The College will continue to expand its innovative scheduling of credit classes to better serve adult students who work or have other obligations. Friday nights and Sundays at the Ossining Center, 7 week accelerated courses at Yonkers/Cross County, Lakeland High School and Port Chester Middle School, an Early Risers Program at Cross County and Ossining, and a late start 11 week session at Port Chester Middle School.
- The EOC will increase training offerings that provide industry, state or national certification. The curriculum for the Medical Billing and Coding program will be modified as necessary to prepare students for certification testing at the conclusion of the program. It will also expand its capacity to provide technical training in the Advanced Technology Training and Information Networking (ATTAIN) Lab and offer a pilot Excel Expert Certification class as well as Microsoft Technology Associate Certification training in IT Pro, Developer and Database.
- EOC will continue to expand its capacity to provide on-line testing and registration services to serve applicants and students more efficiently.
- To increase employment opportunities for students, EOC will explore and develop new partnerships with employers and/or unions.
- The College Connections Program will be expanded to provide a broader array of services to all EOC students and particularly to those who are college bound.

- Information Technology will upgrade PeopleSoft Campus Solutions 9.0R24 to PeopleSoft Campus Solutions 9.0R28.
- Information Technology will upgrade PeopleSoft HR 9.0 to PeopleSoft HR 9.1.
- Information Technology will develop and implement an online admissions application to streamline the student application process.
- Information Technology will begin the project to upgrade the College's phone system, increasing functionality and reducing overall maintenance costs.
- Information Technology will pilot desktop virtualization. An analysis will be done to determine the overall costs and potential savings of implementing this technology for all student PCs.

All Students By Race/Ethnicity Westchester Community College














Under the guidelines set forth by the federal *Student Right to Know Act*, the graduation rate for first-time, full-time, degree-seeking students in the Fall 2006 at Westchester Community College is **11.4%**.

The success rate for students recognizes that many students come to the community college with the intent of transferring before degree completion or may take longer to graduate. With these factors in mind, the success rate for the fall 2006 cohort is **56.7%**.


