Dear Friends,

We are pleased to present this report on our 2012 graduating class. The 1,323 students who received 1,369 degrees were drawn from all six cities and 19 towns in Westchester County and reflect closely the demographic characteristics of the county in terms of gender and ethnic background.

Our graduates are continuing their education at 59 colleges throughout the United States. Over half (56.5%) of the respondents transferred to a four-year college, and over two-thirds (69.5%) are attending full-time.

Over half (57.8%) of the respondents are employed either full-time or part-time. 114 graduates are employed by different companies in Westchester County; while 48 graduates are employed by companies in New York State, but outside the county; and an additional 18 graduates are employed by different firms located in other states. The mean salary for those holding full-time jobs was \$37,499. The median salary was \$30,000.

The evaluation by the graduates of the college and the services it provides continues to remain high. In evaluating the *Overall Quality of Instruction* at Westchester Community College, 93.6% were either *very satisfied* (64.1%) or *satisfied* (29.5%). With regard to their *Overall College Experience*, 96.0% were either *very satisfied* (66.1%) or *satisfied* (29.9%).

The accomplishments of our graduates are a great source of pride to us. We believe you will share these feelings as you read this report.

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MISSION STATEMENT

Westchester Community College provides accessible, high quality and affordable education to meet the needs of our diverse community. We are committed to student success, academic excellence, workforce development, economic development and lifelong learning.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The graduates of Westchester Community College who responded to the 2012 Graduate Survey reported an increase in salaries over the graduates of previous years. The mean salary for those employed full-time is \$37,499, up by \$1,651 from the previous year (\$35,848). Almost two-thirds (57.8%) reported being employed after six months, which is lower than the previous year's graduating class (62.2%).

Employment: The 2012 graduates continued to feel positive about their jobs.

Satisfaction with Job: Over three-fourths (77.5%) of the graduates who responded were either *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their jobs, and almost three-fourths (70.7%) were either *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their *Opportunity to Advance*. Over two-thirds (66.5%) further felt that their education at the college prepared them for their current job either *to a great degree* or *to a slight degree*.

Location of Employment: Over four-fifths (89.5%) of the 2012 graduates who reported being employed were employed in New York State. Over two-thirds (63.0%) of the graduates reported they were employed in Westchester County. Another 26.5% of the graduates were employed outside Westchester, but inside New York State, while 9.9% found employment outside the state. The location of employment for 1.7% could not be determined.

Education: The percentage of the graduates who reported that they transferred to a four-year college increased this year, with 56.5% of the graduates reporting they had transferred to a four-year college compared to 52.0% of the 2011 graduates.

Attending College Full-Time: Of the respondents who reported continuing their education, over two-thirds (69.5%) reported attending college *full-time*. This is a slight decrease from last year's class (72.1%).

Degree Aspirations: As in previous years, a high percentage of the respondents (89.2%) intend to obtain a bachelor's degree or even a post baccalaureate degree. This percentage is higher than the previous year's percentage of 88.3%.

Factors Facilitating Transfer: Responses to a set of questions exploring factors important to facilitating student transfers showed that the ones considered *very important* by the largest percentage of respondents are: *Availability of Program* (77.6%), *Access (i.e. cost, location)* (75.5%), and *Good Academic or Vocational Reputation* (71.5%).

<u>Demographic Characteristics:</u> A review of the demographic characteristics of the entire Class of 2012 reveals some slight changes from previous graduating classes.

Gender: The percentage of female graduates decreased slightly from 60.1% in 2011 to 57.7% in 2012.

Ethnic Background: The percentage of Black graduates (17.0%) decreased slightly compared to last year's class (19.0%), while the percentage of Hispanics increased to 22.8% from 22.2%.

Age: The percentage of students graduating under the age of twenty-two (15.7%) decreased slightly over last year's class (23.5%). The percentage of graduates in the 22 to 29 age group (53.7% in 2012) increased compared to 47.5% in 2011.

<u>Evaluation of College Experience:</u> The respondents to the survey continue to give a positive response on several broad questions concerning Westchester Community College.

Overall College Experience: As in previous years, the overwhelming majority (96.0%) of the 2012 graduates were either *very satisfied* or *satisfied* when asked about their *Overall Westchester Community College Experience*. With regard to the *Overall Quality of Instruction*, 93.6% reported being either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*.

Courses in Major: In evaluating courses in their major, the majority of respondents (93.5%) were either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*. This percentage is lower than the previous year (95.0%).

Availability of Courses: This year, a slightly lower percentage (90.0%) expressed satisfaction with the *Availability of Courses*, than last year's graduating class (93.0%).

Evaluation of Student Services: In another series of questions, respondents were asked to rate their satisfaction with 16 of the college's services. The services to which the students gave the most *very satisfied* responses were: *Library Services* (67.5%), *Availability of Computer Services* (62.3%), *Reading and Math Skills Improvement* (60.1%), and *Advising by Academic Faculty* (58.6%).

<u>Effectiveness of the College in Helping to Achieve Goals of Respondents:</u> A large percentage of the respondents indicated that their goals had been met by their college experience.

Employment Goals: For the seven questions exploring job-related goals, almost eighty five percent of the respondents consistently indicated that Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve these goals.

Transfer Goals: Of the graduates who cited *Transferring to a Four-year Institution* as a major goal, 71.8% indicated that Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve this goal.

Academic Goals: The 2012 graduates were also asked a series of questions about their academic goals. Of the students who cited *Increasing my Knowledge and Understanding* as a goal, 76.7% rated Westchester Community College *very effective* and another 20.3% rated it *somewhat effective* for a total of 97.0%. Of the 2012 respondents, 75.2% rated Westchester Community College *very effective* in helping to achieve their goal of *Increasing my Desire and Ability to Learn* with another 18.4% rating it *somewhat effective*, for a total of 93.6%.

Personal Goals: Majority of our graduates considered achieving personal growth as a part of their reason for attending Westchester Community College. Of the eight sub-goals listed, 89.8% felt Westchester Community College had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in *Develop an Interest in New Ideas* and 86.3% in *Increasing my Desire and Ability to Undertake Self-Directing Learning*.

The results of the survey are based on the responses of the 313 graduates, which represents 23.6% of the entire graduating class of 1,323 students. We are grateful to these students for their cooperation. The responses are a valuable tool for planning and assessment as Westchester Community College strives to provide quality services and instruction.

THE GRADUATES OF 2012

The 2011-2012 Study of the Graduates of Westchester Community College provides information about the 2012 graduating class in three ways. First, it profiles the demographic, educational, and work-related characteristics of these graduates. Secondly, it compares these graduates to graduates in previous years to identify trends existing among our recent graduates. Thirdly, it provides the results of an evaluation by the graduates of the services and resources offered at Westchester Community College, along with an evaluation by the graduates of the effectiveness of Westchester Community College in helping them to achieve these goals. These evaluations are used by the faculty and administrators of the College for planning and assessment purposes.

METHODOLOGY

In Fall 2012, a survey (see Appendix 12) was sent to students who graduated from Westchester Community College either in the late summer of 2011, December 2011, or the spring of 2012, otherwise considered the graduating Class of 2012.

Of the 1,323 students who graduated in the Class of 2012 (1,139 with Associate Degrees and 184 with Certificates); a total of 313 returned a completed, usable survey. This yielded a sample size of 23.7%.

A comparison of the respondents to the known demographic characteristics of the entire 2012 graduating class shows similar percentages with regard to ethnic background, gender, and residence. For example, 44.4% of the respondents are White, while White students comprise 47.9% of the actual graduating class; 16.9% of the respondents are Black compared to 17.0% of the actual graduating class; and 23.3% of the respondents are Hispanic compared to 22.8% of the actual graduating class. With regard to gender, 31.0% of the respondents are male, while males comprised 42.3% of the actual graduating class and 69.0% of the respondents are female, while female comprised 57.7% of the actual 2012 graduating class. Almost three-fourths (72.0%) of the respondents live in Westchester County, while 75.0% of the actual class lived in Westchester.

In certain instances, the total number of students responding to a question does not add up to the total number who returned the survey (313). This is due to the fact that some respondents failed to answer a question or responded to a question that was not applicable to their current status. In these cases, we have used the actual number of respondents.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF ENTIRE CLASS OF 2012

Gender: Almost three-fifths (57.7%) of the graduating class of 2012 are female, as shown in Table I. This represents a slight decrease from the previous year.


Age: One-sixth (15.7%) of the 2012 graduates were under 22 years of age at the time of graduation which was lower than the Class of 2011 (23.5%), as shown in Table I. The percentage of students graduating between the ages of 22 and 29 increased from (47.5%) in 2011 to (53.7%) in 2012.

2012 GRADUATES BY AGE




Ethnic Background: As shown in Table II, almost half of the graduates are White (47.9%), 17.0% are Black, 22.8% are Hispanic, and 4.9% are Asian/Pacific. Non-Resident Alien is no longer a race according to IPEDS.

GRADUATES BY ETHNIC BACKGROUND – 2012




Degrees: Almost two-fifths of the graduates (38.2%) received an AAS degree. The AAS degree continues to be the top degree awarded. Almost one-third (31.9%) graduated with an AA degree, and one-sixth (15.9%) received an AS degree. The percentage of students receiving a certificate increased to 13.9% from 13.6%.

GRADUATES BY DEGREE: 2008-2012




EMPLOYMENT PROFILE OF 2012 GRADUATES

<u>Class of 2012</u>: Almost two-thirds (57.8%) of the 2012 graduates who responded reported being employed, as shown in Table IV. Of those employed, 65.2% reported being employed full-time and 34.8% employed part-time.

Location of employment: Of the respondents who reported the location of their employment, more than half (63.3% or 114 graduates) reported working in Westchester County. Over one-fifth (26.7% or 48 graduates) reported working in New York State, but outside Westchester County bringing the total percentage of those working in New York State to 90.0%. Another 10.0% reported working outside New York State. The work location of 1.7% of the respondents could not be determined.

Salary: The mean salary (average) for the 2012 graduates employed full-time was \$37,499. The median salary was \$30,000. Almost two-thirds of these graduates (54.3%) reported being either very satisfied (12.8%) or somewhat satisfied (41.5%) with their salary, as shown in Table V.

Job Satisfaction: Over three-fourths (77.5%) of the respondents also reported being either *very satisfied* (31.1%) or *somewhat satisfied* (46.4%) with their jobs, while 10.2% of the respondents reported being *somewhat dissatisfied* and another 12.2% reported being *very dissatisfied*, as shown in Table V below.

Opportunity to Advance: Almost three-fourths (70.7%) of the respondents felt either *very satisfied* (36.4%) or *somewhat satisfied* (34.3%) with their opportunities for advancement. This is slightly lower than last year's graduates, where more than three-fourths (74.2%) respondents expressed some degree of satisfaction.

Westchester Community College's Impact on Employment: Almost half (47.5%) of the respondents felt that Finishing Their Degree had been an important function in getting their current job. Of those who reported their employment status, 34.8% also felt that their Specific Program of Study was important in getting their current job.

A total of 57.0% of respondents reported that their current employment was to some degree related to their course of study. Almost two-fifths (37.7%) of the employed respondents indicated that their current occupation was *highly related* to their program of study at the college, and one-fifth (19.3%) indicated that it was *slightly related*.

While over two-fifths (42.9%) indicated that their current job was *not related* to their program of study at the college, over two-thirds (66.5%) of the respondents felt that their Westchester Community College education prepared them for their current job either to a *great degree* (28.6%) or to a *slight degree* (37.9%).


<u>Class of 2012 Employment Status Compared to Previous Classes:</u> A slight increase is seen in the mean beginning salary of the employed graduates when comparing the 2012 graduating class with previous year. The mean beginning salary increased from \$35,848 in 2011 to \$37,499 in 2012 as shown in Table VI.

The percentage of respondents working in Westchester County increased to 63.0%.

LOCATION OF EMPLOYMENT: 2012




The Class of 2012 survey results show a lower percentage employed than the previous year. As shown in Table VII, 57.8% of the 2012 graduates reported being employed, compared to 62.2% in 2011. The percentage of those working full-time increased from 64.0% in 2011 to 65.2% in 2012. The percentage still seeking employment increased from 11.0% in 2011 to 13.7% in 2012.

EDUCATION PROFILE OF 2012 GRADUATES

<u>Class of 2012</u>: Over half of the respondents (56.5%) or 177 respondents reported attending a college, university, or training program, as shown in Table VIII. Of these students, 69.5% reported attending full-time.

The College's Contribution to Achieving Transfer: The 2012 graduates consider Westchester Community College to have been very effective in assisting them to transfer. Of those respondents who indicated transferring was a goal, almost three-fourths (71.8%) reported that the college was either very effective (55.1%) or somewhat effective (16.7%) in helping them to achieve their goal of transferring to a four-year institution.

When graduates were asked how well Westchester Community College prepared them for further study, over two-thirds (68.8%) indicated that they felt *well prepared*, and almost one-third (28.8%) felt *somewhat prepared*. Very few (2.5% or only four graduates) reported feeling *unprepared*.

A large percentage reported being in a field of study either *highly related* (63.2%) or *slightly related* (27.6%) to their program of study at Westchester Community College. However, 9.2% reported being in a field of study *not related or applicable* to their program of study at the college.

Four-Year College's Contribution to Affecting Transfer: The 2012 respondents were asked to rate the most important factors affecting their decision to transfer to a four-year college. The three factors with the highest percentage of respondents rating them very important were: Availability of Program (77.6%), Access (i.e. Location, Cost) (75.5%), and Good Academic or Vocational Reputation (71.5%). The least important factor was Recruitment by this Institution (22.7%), as shown in Table IX.


Future Educational Goals: Over four-fifths (89.2%) of the respondents who are continuing their education expect to earn a bachelor's degree or post baccalaureate degree at the completion of their studies than those in the previous year (88.3%).

Class of 2012 Higher Education Status Compared to Previous Classes: A comparison of the 2012 graduates to the four previous classes with regard to continuing their education shows that the percentages who are continuing their education (56.5%) has increased from the previous year (52.0%). In addition, the percentage attending full-time decreased slightly to 69.5% this year compared to 72.1% last year.

STUDENT EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC EXPERIENCES

Table XI breaks down the evaluations for the Class of 2012 into the more specific responses of very satisfied, somewhat satisfied, somewhat dissatisfied, and very dissatisfied. Over two-thirds (68.4%) of the respondents gave a very satisfied response to their Overall Experience with Courses in Major. Two-thirds (66.1%) of the respondents also were very satisfied with the Overall Westchester Community College Experience.



Degree of Preparation for Further Study: Table XII shows that of the respondents who evaluated the extent to which Westchester Community College had prepared them for further study, more than two-thirds (68.8%) felt that they were *well prepared*. Over one-fourth (28.8%) felt *somewhat prepared* and 2.5% felt they were *not at all prepared*.

STUDENT EVALUATION OF COLLEGE SERVICES

In addition to evaluating the college academically, the graduates were asked to evaluate student services. Table XIII is a breakdown of the results. Students who did not use a service were excluded in calculating percentages.

The evaluation by students of college services shows that the graduates were particularly positive about Overall Experience with Courses in a Major. It received the highest percentage of *very satisfied* responses (68.4%). Library Services (67.5%), Overall Quality of Instruction (64.1%), Availability of Computer Services (62.3%), and Reading and Math Skills Improvement (60.1%) also received high percentage of *very satisfied*.

Those services receiving the greatest percentage of *very dissatisfied* responses were Job & Career Center Services (17.5%), Financial Aid Office Services (16.7%), Cafeteria Food Services (14.3%), Admissions Office Services (13.6%) and Academic Advising by Counseling Faculty (12.3%).

EFFECTIVENESS IN STUDENT GOAL ATTAINMENT

The graduates were also asked to evaluate how effective Westchester Community College has been in helping them to reach goals in four areas: (1) Academic Goals, (2) Career Goals, (3) Personal Goals, and (4) Social/Cultural Goals. The following is a synopsis of the results in each area.

Academic Goals

Goal of Increased Knowledge: Table XIV shows that on each of the six questions exploring the success of the college in helping graduates to achieve their academic goals, majority of the respondents indicated on each sub-goal that Westchester Community College had been either very effective or somewhat effective in helping them.

Transfer Goals: Table XIV shows that 55.1% felt that Westchester Community College had been *very effective* in helping them to *Transfer to a Four-Year Institution*.

The graduates also were asked how effective the college had been in helping them to achieve their goal of *Meeting the Requirements to Enter a Professional or Graduate School*. Of those who consider it a goal 50.0% felt Westchester Community College had been *very effective* in doing so, as shown in Table XIV.

Career Goals

Employment Goals: Table XV consists of seven questions exploring Westchester Community College's effectiveness in supporting the graduates' job-related goals. Taken collectively, majority of the respondents consistently indicated that the college had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve these sub-goals.

In terms of very effective responses, the highest marks were given to Attaining Specific Skills that will be Useful on a Job (60.6%), Attaining a Degree Required for my Present and Future Job (60.3%), Developing a Clearer Idea of my Career Goals and Plans (58.0%), and Improving my Professional Status (56.7%). The lowest was given to Discussing my Vocational Interest (42.7%).

Personal Goals

Personal Growth: Table XVI lists the personal growth objectives to which the respondents gave the highest percentages of *very effective* responses. The top three were *Develop Interest in New Ideas* (64.3%), *Increasing my Desire and Ability to Undertake Self-Directing Learning* (59.8%), and *Improving my Self-Confidence* (59.1%). *Learning to Participate Effectively as a Citizen in my Community* (43.6%) received the lowest percentage of *very effective* responses.



Social and Cultural Goals

Of the graduates who included cultural and social enrichment as goals for attending Westchester Community College, *Increasing my Appreciation of Art, Architecture or Other Visual Arts* received the highest percentage of *very effective* ratings (29.0%) followed by *Becoming Involved in Social Activities* (27.8%), and *Increasing my Appreciation of the Symphony, Operas or Other Forms of Musical Performance* (21.3%). Respondents felt that the college was least effective in supporting *Becoming Involved in Political Activities* (19.7%), and *Increasing my Appreciation of Theater, Plays or Other Forms of Cultural Expression through Performing Arts* (19.7%) as shown in Table XVII.




