

2024 Native Perennial of the Year



Monarda punctata

Spotted beebalm

This unusual, fragrant beauty, beloved by hummingbirds, has multiple whorls of tubular yellow flowers spotted purple from June to July. Attractive showy bracts are pinkish-purple and green on erect stems. Self-sows in sunny, well-drained sites. Nectar source for butterflies; of special value to bees.

Hardiness: Zones 3-8

Light: Sun

Soil: Average to dry **Size:** 12–18" tall

Foliage: Fragrant green leaves

Flowers: Whorls of tubular yellow

flowers with purple spots

Fruit: Brown nutlets
Bloom Time: June to July

Wildlife Value: The flowers attract

pollinators, including bumblebees, butterflies, moths, and hummingbirds. Deer resistant.
