

2019 Native Woody of the Year



Ilex glabra Inkberry

Broadleaf, mound-shaped, evergreen shrub in the holly family provides a year-round presence. Female plants need male inkberry nearby to produce black berries, which are consumed by birds. Excellent as a hedge or foundation planting and as an alternative to

the ubiquitous boxwood.

Hardiness: Zones 4-9

Light: Sun to part shade Soil: Average to wet

Size: 4–8' tall

Foliage: Glossy, leathery, evergreen Inconspicuous, greenish-white

Fruit: Black berries on females **Bloom Time:** Spring to early summer **Wildlife Value:** Attracts birds. Honeybees

produce highly prized gallberry honey.
